Try out for U.S. Bobsled Team at Fiesta Texas

The U.S. Bobsled & Skeleton Federation will make its Bobsled Push Tour this summer. They will be at Fiesta Texas in San Antonio, July 9-10, the second of only five stops in the U.S. and the only stop in Texas.

The federation, hoping to recruit new talent for the U.S. Bobsled Team, will hold tryouts for interested Texas amateur athletes. Anyone who thinks he has the necessary strength and speed required to win a position on the 1994-95 is encouraged to try.

The first 100 applicants will be eligible to compete in the push competition, a dry land version of the start of a bobsled race. The top three finishers will receive a free trip to Lake Placid for the 1994 U.S. National Push Sled championships.

Spectators will have the opportunity to watch exhibition runs between

the U.S. Bobsled Team and the members of the Jamaican Olympic Team as well as meeting these Olympic athletes. They will also get an opportunity to see the Bo-Dyn bobsled actually used in the 1994 Winter Olympic Games built by NASCAR racer and Daytona 500 champion Geoff Bodine.

The other four stops on the bobsled tour are Raleigh, N.C., for July

4th celebration, July 3-4; Mobile, Ala., for Gulf Coast SportsFest, July 16-17; Salt Lake City, Ut., Pioneer Valley Days, July 24-25; and Atlanta, Ga., Emory University, July 30-31.

ORAL & MAXILLOFACIAL SURGEON?

Admittedly, "maxillofacial" is a mouthful. In simplest terms, it refers to that part of the face consisting of the "maxilla," or upper jaw, and cheek bones, on-down past the lower jaw, including the jaw joint. Oral and maxillofacial surgery (oral surgery) includes the diagnosis and surgical treatment of injuries, diseases, and malformations of the mouth and jaws.

Many routine oral surgical procedures may be managed by the family dentist. However, both dentists and physicians refer a wide variety of problems to the oral surgeon. These are services which need a specialist.

Examples include the treatment of cysts, tumors, infections and lesions of the mouth and jaws, as well as the need to remove infected and impacted teeth.

Other more complex problems include jaw and facial fractures; the surgical contouring of the mouth for a better denture foundation; and surgical orthodontic procedures.
