What a finish!

Raiders come from 18 point behind to close win

The Rice Raiders opened the varsity football season with a 24-21 loss to Weimar last Friday. The Raiders were behind 18-0 at halftime. The game could easily have been deja vu of last year's contest with the Wildcats, but it wasn't. The Raiders dominated the second half but could not catch the Wildcats.

The Wildcats opened the game

with an 80 yard kickoff return for a touchdown. The two point conversion was good making the score 8-0.

On the Raiders' ensuing possession, Rice gave Weimar two more points when the ball was snapped out of the end zone on fourth down.

After the free kick Weimar was forced to punt, but the Raiders fumbled the ball and the Wildcats recovered.

Weimar scored three plays later to make the score 18-0 at halftime. Rice opened the second half with a drive that consumed 11:17 minutes of the third quarter, culminating in a two yard touchdown run by Charlyan Thomas. Jesse Bishop's kick made the score 18-7.

Two minutes later Weimar scored again. The conversion attempt failed leaving the score at 24-7.

Thomas scored his second touchdown with 7:34 in the fourth quarter on a 10 yard run. David Godley ran for the two point conversion making the score 24-15.

With 4:01 minutes left in the fourth, Godley scored a touchdown on a one yard run. The kick attempt failed leaving the score 24-21.

The Raiders had one more chance but were turned away on fourth down with 27 seconds remaining. Weimar then ran out the time remaining on the clock to win the game.

Thomas completed four passes in 16 attempts for 75 yards.

Godley had one reception for 17

yards. Lance Spears caught one for 28 yards, Michael Weise was one for 8, and James Cotton, one for 22.

The leading rusher was Godley with 69 yards on 16 carries. Cotton had 26 yards on five carries and Thomas went 25 yards on 10 carries.

On defense the Raiders were led by Larry Henderson and Tim Teague with seven tackles each. Garret Hagendorf also contributed five tackles.

Weise and Clint Krenk each made four tackles. Caesar Buitrago, Fernando Garcia and Gabe Garza had three each. Bishop two, and Godley, Christian Cordova and Heath Mahalic each had one tackle.

Krenk, Hagendorf and Garza each recovered one fumble. The defensive player of the week is Larry Henderson and the offensive player of the week is Caesar Buitrago.

Our hats go off to the Rice Raiders for being the best they can be. "Remember it doesn't matter if you win or lose, it's how you play the game; although it's nice to win," concluded Coach Dennis Jackson.

The Rice Silver team lost to Schulenburg in two games, 15-6, 15-7. Scoring for the Silver were Valerie Korenek with two aces, 4 points; Nina Salazar one ace, 4 points; Sammi Gertson with 3 points; and Sha Sewell and Chazara Scott, 1 point each. Erica Wilkerson also helped in the team effort.

Dove opener looking good

Hunters were expecting a good opening the weekend of Sept. 1. Mourning dove and whitewing dove numbers are up and dove hunters are allowed to take 15 mourning doves per day.

A four-day whitewing dove season was approved for Sept. 10 and 11 in the Special Whitewinged Dove Area. The season has a daily bag limit of 10 doves including no more than five mourning doves and two whitewinged doves. The possession limit is twice the daily bag limit.

May call-count surveys, conducted by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department personnel, indicated a statewide whitewing breeding population of 1.2 million, up from 941,000 the previous year, said Gary Waggener.

man, TPWD assistant dove program leader in Edinburg.

He said the Rio Grande Valley has about a 39% increase in its breeding population. "We are having a good nesting year in the cities. They don't stay in the cities all year round either. Most will move out."

An estimated 615,000 whitewings are nesting in the lower Rio Grande Valley, up from 441,000 last year. In upper South Texas, 577,000 whitewings are nesting through a 16-county area, an increase from the 479,000 in 1993. Waggener said the Trans-Pecos population declined some, but much of the Trans-Pecos population is not surveyed because of the remoteness of the area.
