ing fire fighting personnel when requested by certified mail and authorized by the local air pollution control agency; domestic waste burning at a property designed for and used exclusively as a private residence when collection of domestic waste is not provided by the local governmental

entity; campfires and fires used solely for recreational or ceremonial purposes or in noncommercial preparation of food or supplying warmth during cold weather."

Raider varsity fights hard, falls to Schulenburg Shorthorns

The Rice Raiders fell to 0-2 in their varsity football record following a hard fought 32-14 loss to the Schulenburg Shorthorns.

Schulenburg capitalized on an early Raider fumble to open the scoring with a touchdown at 7:57 in the first quarter. The kick was good making the score 7-0.

The Rice defense provided two goal line stands in the first half, keeping the Shorthorns out of the end zone until only 2:30 remained in the second quarter.

Schulenburg scored again with only a minute left in the first half. Both kicks failed making the score 19-0 at halftime.

Schulenburg opened the second half with another touchdown at 8:10 in the third quarter. The two point conversion attempt failed leaving the score 25-0.

The Raiders answered back with a touchdown pass from Charyan Thomas to Jesse Bishop with 6:02 left in the third.

The two point conversion attempt failed and the score stood 25-6.

Fifty-eight seconds later Schulenburg scored again. The ensuing kick was good making the score 32-6.

Rice scored again on a 56-yard run by James Cotton with 1:54 remaining in the game. Cotton also ran for the two point conversion to end the scoring at 32-14.

Cotton led the Raiders rushing attack with 94 yards and one touch-

down on nine carries. Thomas had 17 yards on two carries while Larry Henderson had two yards on eight carries.

David Godley rushed for 14 yards on five carries before leaving the game with a knee injury. He is expected back this week.

Thomas completed seven passes in 17 attempts for 101 yards and a touchdown enroute to breaking the Rice career passing record. Thomas has passed for 1,458 yards completing 83 of 237 attempts.

The old record of 1,425 yards with 113 completions in 318 attempts was held by Roger Stenke (1971-72).

Thomas and Cotton were named the offensive players of the week.

Leading the receivers was Michael Wiese with four catches for 57 yards. Lance Spears had one catch for 14 yards. Andre Hutton was one for 13 and Bishop one for 17 yards and a touchdown.

The defense was led by Larry Henderson and Clint Krenke. The two defensive players of the week had seven tackles a piece. Thomas added five tackles, Cotton six, and Wiese five.

Garrett Hagendorf had four tackles while Bishop, Caesar Buitrago and Mason Pratt had three each. Heath Mahalic, Gabe Garza, Godley and Fernando Garcia contributed two tackles each, while Shawn Johnson had one tackle.
