## Judge Strunk proclaims Farm Safety Week

From 1983 to 1993, the number of farm residents killed in accidents declined to 2,400 from 3,200. However, the number of farm residents killed increased from 2,200 in 1992 to 2,400 in 1993.

This year's theme for Farm Safety and Health Week is Safety and Health: A Way of Life. It underscores the importance of safety education for children and adults.

### TIPTOE (OUCH!) THROUGH THE TULIPS

There is no upticking around the problem of metatarsalgia, the general term for any of a number of painful conditions that can plague the metatarsal region, or "ball of the foot." A variety of problems may trigger the condition, including callouses, arthritis, bursitis, warts, neuromas (tumors composed of nerve material), tendinitis, foreign bodies, poor circulation, or trauma. Treatment may range from orthotics (prescription shoe inserts) to surgery. If metatarsalgia is caused by a structural deformity of the foot, one of several different surgical techniques may be recommended. For example, a metatarsal osteotomy (surgical fracture of the affected bone) may be necessary to reposition the foot bone.
