SPORTS Raiders set records, suffer defeat

Rice Junior James Cotton set two Raider records Friday, but the team was unable to overcome the Bellville Brahmas who left town with a 3-0 record after defeating Rice 45-0.

Cotton's 98-yard opening kickoff return did not result in a Raider touchdown, but it did break the former record, an 85 yard touchdown return set by Dennis Hemphill in a 1985 game against El Campo.

Cotton's run also set a record for longest play of any kind in Raider history. The previous record was a 95 yard interception return by Tiger Pratt against Needville in 1988.

Bellville scored in every quarter against the Raiders, who had chances early and late in the game but failed to put any points on the board. The Brahmas thwarted Rice's attempts to score twice at the goal line.

Brandon Mathis completed four of 11 pass attempts for two passes for 36 yards and Cotton got 40 yards on two receptions.

Charyan Thomas took the ball 45 yards on 13 carries. Cotton carried the ball four times for 27 yards and David Godley ran 25 yards on four carries. Heath Mahalic punted five times for 187 yards.

Cotton took the ball 144 yards on two kickoff returns. Shawn Johnson returned two kickoffs for 19 yards. Godley and Mathis each took a kickoff for no yards.

Clint Krennek was lineman of the week and Billy Ray Johnson was defensive player of the week.

Rice goes on the road again this week to take on Brookshire Royal at 7:30 p.m., Friday, Oct. 21.

These studies indicate that NPY builds up during time of low food intake — before breakfast, for example — and that unexplained surges of NPY may be partly responsible for eating disorders like bulimia. Still another brain chemical — serotonin — makes you feel full and satisfied. Serotonin and carbohydrates trigger the production of serotonin in the brain. In effect, serotonin is the key to keeping your sweet tooth under control.

While it's important to understand how these chemicals affect appetite, the best way to control your "sweet tooth" is still through moderation and will power.
