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Triple Therapy For Ulcers

Recently it has been shown that approximately 70 percent of ulcers in the stomach and between 90 to 100 percent of ulcers in the small intestine are caused by a bacteria called *Helicobacter pylori*. This bacteria often occurs in the intestine of otherwise healthy individuals. Some health experts now think that this organism may be responsible for the gastritis (inflammation of the stomach) that is so prevalent in many older persons.

In the past, treatment of intestinal ulcers has included H2 receptor antagonist medicines such as *cimetidine* and *ranitidine* to decrease acid production; antacids such as *aluminum hydroxide*; acid secretion inhibitors such as *omeprazole*; and *sucralfate* to protect the healing ulcer. The latest approach to treating gastrointestinal ulcers is with medicines that eliminate *Helicobacter pylori*. Antibiotics are recommended, especially when ulcer treatment is resistant to conventional medicines, when there are ulcer complications, and in situations where the symptoms are severe enough to require surgery. The combination of medicines used to treat *Helicobacter pylori* often is referred to as "triple therapy." Best results have been achieved using a combination of (1) bismuth subsalicylate (Pepto-Bismol®), (2) tetracycline or amoxicillin, and (3) metronidazole or clarithromycin.

Coach Peacock, a new face at RHS

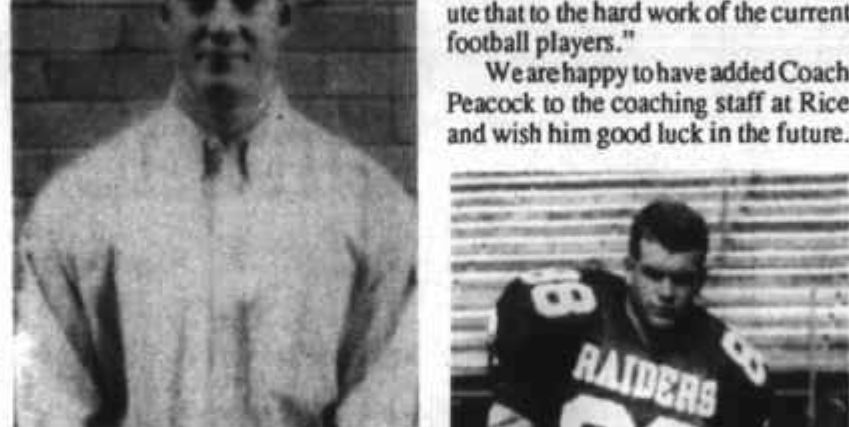
