January proclaimed 'TB Awareness Month'

The Texas Chapter of the American Lung Association and Gov. Ahn Richards have declared January as Tuberculosis Awareness Month in the state.

During the week of Jan. 17-21, a team of experts from the Center for Disease Control, Texas Dept. of Health and the Lung Association with pulmonary doctors across the United States will be making on-site visits to cities in Texas including Houston and Beaumont-Port Arthur.

These experts will review the current TB programs to document an independent, objective, outside evaluation of health department and other community TB prevention and elimination efforts. They will assess the effectiveness of related public, private and voluntary activities and make recommendations for more effective and efficient activities.

Results of the review will be presented in a press conference Jan. 21 at the Texas Medical Association in Austin.

TB is an infectious, communicable disease caused by Mycobacterium Tuberculosis. The disease is usually treatable with traditional drugs when diagnosed promptly. The lungs are involved in about 85% of cases but other parts of the body can also be affected.

Symptoms of TB include feeling tired or sick, persistent cough, unexplained weight loss, fever, chest pain, difficult breathing or coughing up blood. People with TB usually have several symptoms. However, people with the TB infection have the germ in their bodies but are not sick. They cannot spread the disease but can develop the disease later.

A simple TB skin test may be used to test for the disease. TB is spread by a person with TB talking, coughing, singing, sneezing or otherwise expelling droplets of saliva. Their contaminated air is breathed by those close by. It is more likely to occur in closely confined spaces.

The City of Houston reported 1,696,319 cases in 1992, the highest of any city in Texas. Infection occurred at the rate of 42.6 persons per 100,000 population, also the highest rate in the state.

The entire state had the fourth highest number of cases in the United States in 1992.

San Antonio Rodeo... a 16-day extravaganza

San Antonio's 45th Annual Stock Show and Rodeo is the largest single event for the city each year. The 1994 show will be 16 days of entertainment and livestock beginning Feb. 5 and running through Feb. 20.

It retains the status of being the largest junior livestock show and one of the top five rodeos in the nation. Over 17,500 total livestock entries are expected and the San Antonio Livestock Exposition (SALE) will award over \$1.57 million in total premiums and prize money.

Among the new highlights of the SALE will be the first NAPPA sanctioned Potbellied Pig contest which promises to be an eye-catcher. The first potbellied pigs arrive Feb. 5 for judging Feb. 6 and 7.

A new junior division is added to the breeding swine show which will be Feb. 10 and 11.

The open beef cattle will add Limousin and Longhorn divisions to the cattle show. This Longhorn show will be recognized as a world qualifying show.

The all breed steer class will increase categories in the junior market.

A new law that went into effect Jan. 1 eliminates the need for commercial vehicle operators to have their commercial vehicles under dual inspections.

The new inspection program is under the Texas Department of Public Safety. It combines the U.S. Department of Transportation inspection with the state of Texas safety inspection.

Inspections obtained at other than an official commercial Texas state inspection station will not be accepted.

Commercial motor vehicle means any self-propelled or towed vehicle except a farm vehicle with a gross weight, registered weight or gross weight rating of less than 48,000 pounds used on a public highway to transport passengers or property when:

- The vehicle or combination of vehicle had a gross weight, registered weight or gross weight rating in excess of 26,000 pounds;
- Or the vehicle is designed to transport more than 15 people including the driver;
- Or the vehicle is used to transport an amount of hazardous materials requiring placards under the federal Hazardous Materials Transportation Act.

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
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How to Get Rid of Head Lice


Head lice are tiny, wingless insects that reside on the scalp and hair of humans (mostly children). Lice live off the blood they suck from bites to the scalp. Infestations are highly contagious and affect more than 10 million Americans each year. Lice can be transferred on combs, brushes, and other objects. Outbreaks are common in schools and day care centers. Bites and fecal deposits from head lice may cause itching of the scalp.

The adult female louse may lay up to 150 eggs in one infestation. The eggs become attached to hair follicles. Effective treatment of head lice involves killing the lice as well as eggs attached to the hair. According to the Handbook of Nonprescription Drugs, the medicine of choice for treating head lice in adults and children is 1% permethrin cream rinse. Before applying the rinse, shampoo the hair with regular shampoo. Rinse the hair before applying permethrin. Let the rinse remain on the scalp for 10 minutes. Rinse and dry the hair again. Remove lice/eggs and egg shells from the hair with the special comb provided. That hatch after the first treatment. Wash combs and hair brushes in the lice-killing rinse and then boil them. All family members in contact with the affected child should be treated. Product labeling suggests that you not use permethrin rinse on children under age two.
