Vaccines for Children Program

Last year the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services announced the Vaccines for Children Program. According to a report in Journal of American Medical Association, the program, which will be introduced in January (1995), will provide free vaccines to children at participating private and public health centers. Health officials are concerned about the low immunization rates of children. According to the Center for Diseases Control, the current vaccination rate of 2-year-old children is only 55 to 88 percent. A goal of one federal program for 1996 is to increase immunizations for polio, measles, mumps, rubella, diphtheria, pertussis, tetanus, hepatitis B, and haemophilus influenza b among all

Polio affected up to twenty thousand Americans each year in the 1950s. Vaccines introduced in the mid 50s and early 60s lowered the incidence of polio dramatically. Measles and mumps are highly contagious diseases caused by viruses. A single vaccine (MMR) protects children against measles, rebella, and mumps. Protection against diphtheria, tetanu: (lockjaw), and pertussis (whooping cough) is provided through another vaccine (DPT). Protection against haemophilus influenzae, an organism associated with bacterial meningitis, is provided by the Hib vaccine




