



Croup is Common in Young Children

The medical word for this common childhood respiratory problem is laryngotracheobronchitis. It is better known as the croup, a condition characterized by a barking cough and noisy, rapid breathing. The child also may have a runny nose and fever for a few days. Croup typically occurs in children under 3 years of age, but has been seen in children up to 10 years old. The cough and breathing problems are caused most often by a virus which results in inflammation, swelling, and narrowing or obstruction of the airway passages. Attacks of croup often occur at night. Children may awaken with loud, raspy breathing which is most noticeable as they inhale.

Holding the child in the bathroom near the steam of a hot water shower for 10 to 15 minutes may help reduce symptoms. A similar benefit may occur if the child is exposed to cooler outdoor air for a few minutes. A cold water vaporizer in the child's room may do the same thing. If fever is present, acetaminophen in an appropriate dose may be helpful. The child should be encouraged to drink as much water as they want. If the child does not respond, call your physician or take the child to a hospital emergency room. Epinephrine may be given to improve air flow. Some children are hospitalized, but the stay usually s brief and improvement is rapid.
