Founder's Day honors Walter W. Ross, a man who, during the Depression, saw a need among the young women he met in his work as a traveling encyclopedia salesman. He believed they needed more in their lives than work, responsibility and hardship, and decided to devote his life to providing them with a social and cultural outlet.

His efforts bought seven young women in Abilene, Kansas, together in 1931 to form that sort of organization. Beta Sigma Phi met their needs, and continues to meet the needs of hundreds of thousands of women today. This April 30th, Walter Ross will be remembered by this, the largest Greek letter sorority in the world.

Throughout the 64 years of its history, members of Beta Sigma Phi have enjoyed the programs of cultural studies and numerous social events. They devote much of their time and effort to service, and recently raised over \$300,000 for sorority sisters who suffered losses due to natural disasters. Beta Sigma Phi's are also funding a breast cancer research project.

A typical year finds the chapters donating over \$3 million directly to local charities, reflecting over 200,000 work hours. The chapters have created their own international funds, which donate millions to research groups, hunger projects and other worthwhile causes. Through Beta Sigma Phi's international loan and scholarship funds, members and their families receive assistance.

Basic to Beta Sigma Phi, however, are the socials for its members. One of the most important is Founder's Day. Alpha Delta Phi and Xi Pi Psi chapters will meet April 29th at The Farris 1912 to observe Founder's Day.

Awards will be presented during the evening to outstanding chapter members, recognizing them for sorority and community work. Some projects of Alpha Delta Phi are: try favors for hospital patients, two Thanksgiving baskets, Christmas basket for an elderly person, sponsor youth dances and Annual Scholarship for a high school senior.
