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Tendonitis & Bursitis Should Be Treated
Tendonitis and bursitis are painful conditions that involve body tissues near or connected to the joints. Neither should be left untreated.
Tendonitis is an inflammation of the tissue that connects muscle to bone. The most common cause of tendonitis is the trauma of excess physical activity, such as that experienced by nonathletes who suddenly run a long distance without adequate stretching or warm-up. The Achilles tendon (connects the calf muscle to the heel bone) frequently is involved in tendonitis. The shoulder and elbow also are commonly involved.
Bursitis is an inflammation of the fluid sacs or pouches located between bones and ligaments or tendons. These sacs or pouches help eliminate friction and maintain smooth muscle movement over the bones.
The treatment of tendonitis and bursitis is similar - decrease pain, swelling, and inflammation. Injections of steroids may be necessary if nonsteroidal antiinflammatory drugs (NSAIDs) are not effective. NSAIDs prescribed may include ibuprofen, naproxen, etodolac, and sulindac. Compression bandages may be applied to support weak joints and to decrease swelling.

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No emotions, just the facts

The opposition to the Hospital District has taken the stance that we should make our decision to support the district or vote no based on facts only, not emotions. To that end, I have set forth these rational, fact-based issues below.

The rational issues which should be kept in mind while deciding your vote for the Hospital District are these:
1. Healthtrust will close this hospital, they have already conceded this fact and it is a given - their main thrust is to support Wharton. If you don't believe this, ask the former employees of Sam Houston Memorial Hospital and the present employees of El Campo.

2. If this hospital closes or is taken over by Healthtrust, the indigent and Medicaid patients will go to Columbus. Columbus will then have to pass a tax district. Would you rather live and pay taxes in a Columbus Hospital District or the Rice Hospital District?

3. Why hand a facility with \$3.5 million annual net revenues over to Healthtrust for \$500,000, only to have it close? This is good business?

4. The businesses and employers in this area should consider where their business comes from, who pays their bills, and the great loss the \$2 million annual hospital payroll would have upon their viability.

These are unemotional, black and white, rational business facts; facts which should be well known by this district, considering all the town meetings and publicity set forth by the hospital Board of Directors and the present administrator. Make your decision based on these facts, not on how many people will die if this hospital is not here.

To the voters of the Rice Consolidated Independent School District:

I urge you to strongly consider the consequences of your vote on the Rice Hospital tax district and vote FOR the district. The closing of the hospital will have a direct, negative effect on the economic situation of the entire Rice School District.

An event of this magnitude will effect all of us in the RCISD whether we utilize the hospital or not. Major economic developments (positive or negative) have an impact on all of us in the southern portion of Colorado County, and in particular the RCISD.

As Mr. Bill Wilson stated in one or more of his previous letters, and quite correctly, the continued economic decline in our portion of southern Colorado County has led to a steady reduction in property values along with decreasing revenues from sales tax proceeds. With both of these major revenue sources shrinking, the Rice School District Board as well as the city of Eagle Lake has, out of necessity, had to increase property tax rates to continue to provide a stable level of service and support to their citizens.

I respectfully disagree with Mr. Wilson (and others who echo his sentiments) as to the plan of action needed to reverse or at least slow the increase in property tax rates. The answer is not to allow the further decline in our tax base and subsequent increase in unemployment by allowing the hospital to close but to continue to push for economic revitalization using the hospital as the valuable tool it is.

If we allow the hospital to close its doors, I submit to you that in the very near future we, in the Rice Consolidated Independent School District, will see even larger tax rate increases. These increases will be needed to offset the accelerated economic decline attributable to the hospital closing. If we let the hospital close, will the same fate follow for some of the businesses that use the hospital directly? The Heritage House, Thomas Clinic, Eagle Lake Medical Clinic, Eagle Lake Drugstore and more may all suffer the "domino effect".

With the current economic situation in and around Eagle Lake starting to see some positive improvement, this is certainly not the time to "give up". The April sales tax rebate sent to Eagle Lake was up an exciting 91.15%! Along with a steady increase over the last several reporting periods, this most certainly shows signs that we may be coming out of our "slump".

As Mr. Bill Harrison Jr. stated at the public meeting in Eagle Lake, the closing of the Hospital will greatly decrease our chances of getting a prison facility in Eagle Lake or any other industry for that matter.

The Texas Department of Criminal Justice is planning to build four to five maximum security prisons to house 9,000 prisoners. The competition among the numerous counties and communities bidding for one of these facilities will be ferocious. When business and industry look at prospective communities to locate, they look at the amenities each community has to offer; not only to the business itself, but just as important, what each competing community can offer the employees of that company. Healthcare, education and recreation are just a few of the items they are concerned with. There are of course no guarantees but I can assure you, we will have a much better chance to win the bid for a prison or any other business with a hospital than without one.

While attending Rice High School, I developed many close ties and friendships with residents of Garwood and Sheridan. Since attending Rice and developing those ties, I have felt the need to support events in those communities with the thought that each community's well being indirectly, if not directly, affects the others.

The name "Eagle Lake Community Hospital" is such only because it happens to be in Eagle Lake. The hospital was built through the generous contributions of people from all over southern Colorado County. There are many people from outside Eagle Lake who work at the Hospital and many others who utilize its excellent services. A community hospital it certainly is, in the business to serve only Eagle Lake, certainly not.

I appreciate the valid questions and concerns that people like Mr. Bill Wilson and Mr. Stenke have brought to the debate, being able to openly debate the issues is what makes our country work. We all have had questions, I just hope we are listening to the answers.

No one can look into the future and see whether our community will flourish, survive or fail, but to tear down one of the most important institutions we have surely will not help our chances of improving our situation.
