with respect to the Texas Open Meetings Act. The two attorneys also provided the Board with advice on proposed bylaws and lease of the hospital from the Eagle Lake Community Hospital corporation.

Action by the Board was taken on several matters. Joan Mathews was elected presiding officer until bylaws are prepared and approved.

Jim Buckner was appointed administrator for the District.

A motion was made, but tabled, to have Oct. 1 as the date on which the tax district effectively begins to operate the hospital.

A tentative tax rate was set at 20¢ per \$100 valuation as recommended by Buckner.

This rate, an estimate, will be used by the June 1 notices to be sent out by the Colorado County Central Appraisal District. The actual rate will not be set until after July 15 when the final tax roll is released. By that time, the District will also have more accurate data for its budget. The Board also approved the same tax exemptions that other taxing authorities in Colorado County have granted. The homestead exemption, age 65 and over exemption, and the 20% exemption were approved. The Board agreed to tax personal property, e.g. motor vehicles and boats, in the same manner as the other authorities in the county. The personal property tax will require a public hearing, and the Board authorized the administrator to do so.

Committees were named and staffed to address bylaws, finance and interhospital relations.

Cline advised the Board that the District is, and always will be, a distinct and separate entity from the hospital corporation. The corporation will be responsible for hospital operations until it is transferred by agreement to the District. Currently, the District has no funds or resources for assuming indigent care and should not be held liable for such care until Oct. 1 (when tax collection begins).

A date of June 11 was set for the next Executive Board meeting. It will be held, beginning at 7 p.m., in the Hospital Conference Room.

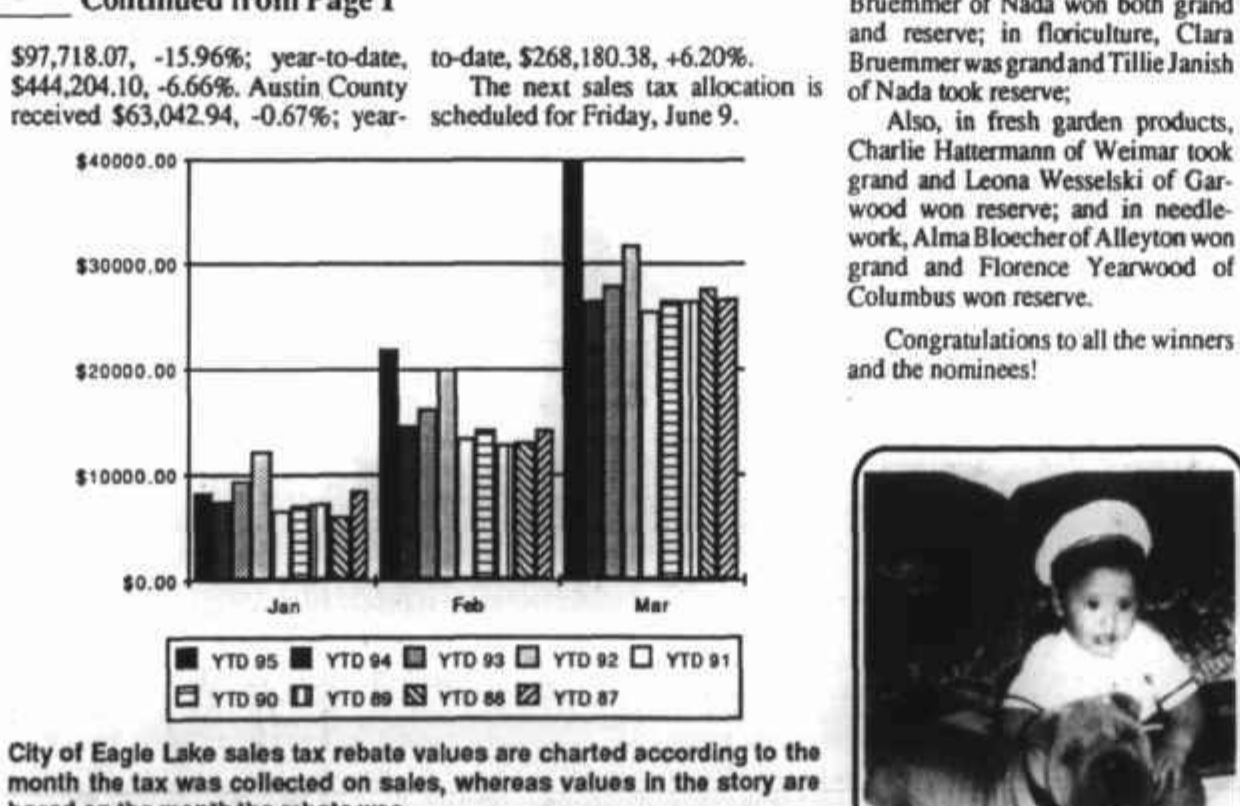

City of Dallas for May was the second largest, up 1% over the \$16.3 million for the same period last year.

The sales tax rebate to San Antonio was \$10 million, up 4.6% from the \$9.6 million payment in May 1994.

The City of Austin's sales tax rebate of \$7.4 million reflected a 2.2% increase over the \$7.3 million payment one year ago.

The City of Ft. Worth's sales tax rebate of \$5.9 million was 6.2% above the May 1994 payment of \$5.6 million. Arlington was delivered \$5.5 million, 2% more than the \$5.4 million in rebates last May.

The May tax rebate to El Paso was \$3.5 million, an 8.2% drop from the May 1994 rebate of \$3.9 million.

Other cities in our area, the amounts of their sales tax rebates this month, along with the change from this month last year are:

Columbus, \$42,632.31, +10.38%; Weimar, \$12,775.08, -6.87%; Sealy, \$44,536.07, -1.49%; Bellville, \$20,176.19, -18.87%; El Campo, \$136,823.23, -7.67%; Wharton, \$94,062.66, +13.25%.

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911 Addressing moving forward

Colorado County Commissioners' Court approved an agreement with Sedgwick and Associates of Houston for 911 rural addressing during Monday morning's meeting.

Sedgwick and Associates will furnish the County with topography information and 911 addressing at a cost of \$36,000. However, the funds will be paid through a grant with the Houston-Galveston Area Council with the County supplying approximately \$8,000 of in-kind services.

Commissioner Jerome Wicke questioned the need for the County "progress in such a fast manner."

"I don't think we need reflective-type signs and so forth. We just don't need to spend a lot of money on these fancy signs," said Wicke.

"The first priority is to get the data, mapping and addressing," said Debs Martin, who is in charge of the County's 911 project.

"The first step is the mapping system. It gets us the groundwork... then we can go back and put the signs up under whatever specs we choose," said Commissioner Richard Seifert.

"I don't care what kind of number you put out there (for rural addressing) if we have no one to direct them (emergency personnel) to it, it doesn't do us any good," said Wicke.

"I have had several citizens ask me when we were going to get rural addressing. They want it," said Seifert.

"If you have an address, the dispatcher can look on a map and see where that address is located."

"It will be a big asset to the dispatchers," said Sheriff Bill Esterling.

The Court also agreed to contract with Southwestern Bell Telephone to move the 911 PSAP equipment from the current jail to the new detention facility at a cost of approximately \$4,700.

Commissioners also received word of a pending lawsuit in federal court by a former Colorado County Jail inmate, Richard Kincaid, against county officials in regards to the jail conditions.

The suit stated that the jail had no law library and medical facilities, among other items.

County Judge Vince Slominski said that John Julian Moore, the county attorney, would answer the lawsuit. Kincaid is currently in jail in Virginia and, according to County officials, this is not the first time he has filed a suit in federal court with a complaint along the same lines.

In other business, the Court:

- Awarded the bid for the construction of four bridges in Precinct 3 — Sandy Branch on Metz Road, Schmitt Creek on New Elm Road, Willow Creek on Bernardo Road and Willow Creek on New Elm Road — to BLS Construction Co. of El Campo at a total cost of \$186,167.70;
- Appointed Tracy Wegenhoft, Harvey Vornsand, Ronnie Rogers and Norbert Meisner to the Colorado County Water Council;
- Tabled a decision on skid tanks and their location, as well as radio console equipment and radios and their installation, at the new detention facility and authorized the advertisement for landscaping at the site;
- Authorized advertisement for reconstruction of approximately 3,800 feet of runway, drainage improvements and upgrading airfield lighting, at Robert R. Wells Jr. Airport;
- Amended an ordinance subdivision as required by the National Flood Insurance Program Standards; and
- Adopted a resolution of appreciation to the Rev. Larry Burney and Joe Fling who served the County as Section 8 administrator and public defender, respectively.
