For National Police Week... Eagle Lake honors Chief of Police

Eagle Lake commemorated National Police Week, Friday, May 19, with a ceremony recognizing Chief of Police Keith Webb for his daily effort in defending the law, the city and its people.

James Webster, director of U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm's southeast Texas office, delivered remarks regarding the significance of National Police Week and presented Webb with a certificate of appreciation from Gramm.

The ceremony was held at the Eagle Lake Police Station.

Webster also read a letter sent by Gramm commending the police officers for their contribution in fighting the war against crime and drugs on city streets.

National Police Week, enacted by Congress, was observed May 15-19.

"All too often, when we go to bed at night, we forget about the men and women who continue to patrol our streets, allowing us the feeling of security. They put their lives on the line for us daily, a fact many of us take for granted," the senator said.

"This is truly the only profession that I know where the employees are virtually on the job 24-hours a day. Police officers, many with families of their own, risk their lives to protect ours. It is for that reason that we should honor these men and women who have answered the call, unselfishly giving of themselves," Gramm said.

National Police Week, sponsored by the American Police Hall of Fame, will celebrate its 34th year of honoring those who protect and serve.

Heart Attack Risk and Certain High Blood Pressure Medicines

Concerns about the risk of heart attacks from calcium channel blockers were widely published in the media earlier this year following the presentation of a scientific paper at the American Heart Association's Annual Meeting. News reports indicated that researchers had discovered a 60 percent increased risk of heart attacks in persons who took these medicines.

Statistics indicated that if 1,000 persons took a calcium blocker, 16 persons in the group might have a heart attack. If they used other medicines (diuretics or beta blockers) only 10 out of 1,000 might have an attack. The actual increased risk is quite small regardless of which drug was used. And there are potential problems with the study. It is possible, for example, that those who received calcium channel blockers were sicker than others.

Larger studies such as the Antihypertensive and Lipid-Lowering Treatment to Prevent Heart Attack Trial (ALLHAT) are needed to answer questions raised by this report. In the meantime, the American Heart Association's Office of Scientific Affairs is advising patients not to stop taking calcium blocker medicines on their own. Consult your physician if you have questions about these or other high blood pressure medicines.
