CCLEA board meeting held

The Colorado County Law Enforcement Association held its first membership meeting on June 7 at the Mansfield Building in Columbus with nine members attending.

Formed in Sept. 1994 with the primary intent to provide safety equipment not provided by area department and financial assistance to officers injured in the line of duty, the organization currently has 54 paid members.

Other goals include providing scholarships for future peace officers, aiding with continuing education costs for present law enforcement agents and purchasing life insurance for county officers.

Shirley Kearbey, president of the organization, welcomed members and highlighted many of the accomplishments and future goals of the group.

Since its beginning, the organization has been represented in two local parades and board members have visited the three city councils, commissioners court and various civic clubs to share the group's goals.

The board of directors also organized a bake sale that netted almost \$400 in April 29.

The proceeds were used to purchase a "wish list" item for each of the four county police departments in May.

The Colorado County Sheriff's Department was given a shotgun while the Columbus Police Department was presented a cube refrigerator. Rechargeable flashlights were presented to both the Eagle Lake and Weimar Police Departments.

"Our goal was to have 100 members and to purchase at least one item from each wish list by the end of the first year."

"We are just nine months old and have 54 members and already bought each department one item," Kearbey said.

She also outlined plans for a bike and/or walk-a-thon set for Saturday, Sept. 30.

The event will involve children from all schools in the county as well as parents, friends and peace officers themselves.

If successful, this will be an annual event held in all areas of the county on a rotating basis. The location of the Sept. 3 event has not been finalized.

"We would like to have some sort of information booth at the Colorado County Fair, but we need volunteers. We also need volunteers to help with collecting money at car washes this summer and fall. We need help and we need members," Kearbey said.

Another thing the organization needs is a new secretary, according to Kearbey. She announced the resignation of Rhonda Lattimore from that position, effective July 15.

Maurine Schley resigned from the vice president's position in March and Kathleen Neisner was appointed to that place until an election of officers can be held in Jan. 1996.

No replacement has been named for Lattimore's position.

Other board members include Patty Stavinoha as 2nd vice president Brenda Becker as treasurer.

Memberships for the Colorado County Law Enforcement Association are \$12.50 per year for licensed peace officers, \$25 for individuals and \$100 for businesses. Lifetime memberships are also available.

The next meeting will be held at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, July 11, in Frelsburg at the Becker's residence. Call 409-732-6981 for directions.

We need to reclaim our town!!! Teachers are disheartened because of the lack of concern from the parents. If we lose our kids, what will it all have been for? It is a sad day when we have to bear arms to protect ourselves and our property.

Largest in the world... Texas prison system to expand by 14

More than 18,000 state inmates that have been temporarily housed in county jails will enter 13 new state prisons this month and in July and a 14th facility will open in August, in the state's \$1.5 billion prison expansion program.

With the new prisons operating, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice capacity reaches 133,000 inmates and becomes the largest modern prison system in the world.

Another 14 state prison facilities are scheduled to open in 1996, increasing the capacity to 144,000 inmates, said TDCJ spokesman Glen Castleberry.

"Thanks to the vision of Legislature and the taxpayers who approved the prison construction bonds, Texas is ahead of the curve," said TDCJ executive director James A. "Andy" Collins.

Cost State \$650 Million

The number of state prisoners being housed in county jails peaked at nearly 30,000 in 1994, and cost the state more than \$650 million in fines and payments to counties that housed state prisoners.

The backlog of prisoners housed in county jails swelled in the late 1980s due to increasing crime coupled with a federal court order that curbed overcrowding in the state's prison system.

Senator's Contract Suspended

Harris County's adult probation department has suspended the consulting contract of State Sen. John Whitmire, pending an investigation by the district attorney.

State District Judge George Godwin, who chairs the committee of judges that oversees the probation department, said that though he believes Whitmire's contract went through proper channels, it was "bad judgment" to have accepted it, the *Houston Chronicle* reported.

Godwin was not chair when the \$4,000 a month contract was accepted in 1993. Whitmire was retained by the probation department to assist in legal issues regarding penal code changes that he wrote into state law during the 1993 legislature session. To date he has been paid more than \$80,000.

The state constitution prohibits legislators from benefiting directly or indirectly from legislation for which they appropriate money. But Whitmire claims he was not paid with state money, and therefore did not violate

Sunscreen Protection: Cancer and Premature Aging of Skin

The American Cancer Society stresses the fact that skin cancer is a preventable disease. A recent report in the journal *U.S. Pharmacist* indicates that 90 percent of the 200,000 cases of skin cancer that will be diagnosed this year "would not have occurred if persons had heeded rules about staying out of the sun and using sunscreens." Dr. Mark Naylor, a dermatologist at the University of Oklahoma, indicates that there is no doubt that sunscreens also reduce the risk of looking old prematurely. Dr. Naylor tells his patients that wrinkles and other signs of age are due to sunlight. Other comments from this specialist regarding sunscreen products are reported in a recent issue of *American Pharmacy*.

- Sunscreens may sting when sweat washes them into your eyes. This is a minor irritation compared to getting skin cancer.
- Sunscreens should be worn for all types of outdoor activities. Apply sunscreens to the face because the face is exposed to the elements all year long.
- Men should apply sunscreens to the face after shaving instead of using an after-shave product. Women should apply sunscreens before putting on makeup. Protect babies and children. Sunburn during childhood is linked to skin cancer later in life.

Views On Dental Health

PERIODONTAL DISEASE?

It's a fact. Adults lose more teeth to periodontal (gum) disease than they do to tooth decay or any other dental problem. There are two stages of gum disease. The mildest and earliest form is gingivitis, an inflammation of the gums due to plaque buildup. If treated promptly, it is reversible. The most destruction of all is periodontitis, which causes irreversible changes in supporting tissue and even destruction of the bone that holds the teeth in place.

The primary cause of periodontal disease is plaque, a sticky, colorless, bacteria-laden film that forms on the teeth. This eventually turns to tartar (a hard, granular substance) which irritates the gums and causes them to pull away from the tooth and form "pockets" which become inflamed.

The only way to guarantee healthy gums and teeth is to remove plaque and tartar with proper brushing and flossing. Also, don't miss your check-ups and professional cleanings. Your dentist can detect and treat early gum problems if given a chance.
