If a bunion deformity is diagnosed early on, the cause and symptoms may be controlled through such measures as exercise, footwear, prescription orthotics, and anti-inflammatory medication. ment entities. These reports and associated miscellaneous paperwork run the full gamut from keeping tabs on the refuge's vehicles fleet to population numbers on a particular wildlife group such as waterfowl, to monitoring oil and gas activities on a refuge.

As a law enforcement officer, a refuge manager is responsible for protecting the refuge's habitat and its wildlife from all harms, and protecting the public that visits the refuge. The Endangered Species Act, Refuge Systems Act, Migratory Bird Treaty Act, and special refuge regulations give the manager the authority to enforce these laws throughout the area.

As a supervisor, a refuge manager is responsible for the individuals that work at the refuge. This responsibility includes directing staff people in daily refuge operations, and evaluating each individual under his/her supervision, just as any other supervisor in the private sector.

Although a refuge manager is responsible for the above duties, it does not mean that he/she does all of these duties, all of the time. Managers have several dedicated and knowledgeable employees on their staffs that take care of the specifics of each duty; however, it is imperative that refuge managers be knowledgeable of each aspect to manage a national wildlife refuge effectively.
