Sunday, June 4, 14 adults and 4 youths visited the Marine Education Center in Palacios. The hostess was Cathy Porter, Biologist for Palacios ISD, who with her young son, guided members on the Nature Trail at the center.

Built and maintained with a little impact on the area as possible, the trail meandered along the shore and through a salt marsh where members observed numerous examples of flora and fauna. Labels indicated representative examples of vegetative growth and animal habitat.

Marine Biology Lab where tanks and aquaria displayed samples of marine life. The younger attendees enjoyed touching the small, live sting rays. Their barb had been removed for closer study.

The June 19 meeting presented a good chance to become familiar with the owls of the county. The six owls known from the county highlighted the program.

Emphasized were their nocturnal habits, keen eyesight, sensitive hearing, quiet flight, nighttime hoots and screeches, roosting and nesting areas, and weakness for rodent dinners. Locally the barn owl, also called the monkey-faced owl, is best known.

Club members got to view a museum specimen up close. In order to appreciate this owl's superb rodent-catching ability, each club member did some hands-on dissecting of owl pellets. These roundish items contain the coughed-up remains of undigested hair, feathers, skull and body bones of their prey.

Identified as victims of hungry barn owls were shrews, harvest mice, white-footed mice, pygmy mice, cotton rats, insects, and some small birds. The array of foods that these owls eat was perhaps that most fascinating part of this inspection process.

Rollin Baker offered some of the commentary and Steve Labuda furnished the pellets which he had picked up below an owl roost in an oak barn at the Atwater Prairie Chicken NWR.

Steve also updated the membership on the status of the prairie chicken hatchery.

Nature Notes

River bluffs, upstream on the Colorado River are interesting bluffs; will work our view.

Flowering springs and Artesian Wells: we need to locate these and keep track of their status.

Fossil watch in gravel pits: Important is the need to encourage gravel pit operators and gravel recipients to watch for bones and other remains of extinct Ice Age mega-mammals.

Pathologists know that many kinds of large and now-extinct critters roamed our area eight to 10 thousand years ago. There have been specimens saved of elephant-like mammoths and mammoths and a few others. Our local museums could preserve more of these finds. We need examples of extinct camels, horses, sabertooth tigers, tapirs, ground sloths, and glyptodonts. We really can't find them ourselves, everyone can help.

Area Refuges

It is not early to think about sites designated as nature reserves. Yes, we have the Atwater Prairie Chicken National Wildlife Refuge. But are there other distinctive habitats which should be preserved? This is worth some thought.

Smokers face another, less well known problem that nonsmokers do not share. Research has shown that cigarette smoke can interact with some of the medicines people commonly take. Here is a list from a U.S. government publication: Pain relievers: Smoking may reduce the effect of painkillers such as propoxyphene (Darvon) and pentazocine (Talwin). Antidepressants: The effect of antidepressant medicines such as amitriptyline (Elavil), imipramine (Tofranil), and doxepin (Sinequan) can be reduced by cigarette smoke. Oral contraceptives: The risk of serious complications from oral contraceptive use (blood clots, strokes, and heart attacks) can be increased by smoking. Beta blockers: Smoking may inhibit the effect of propranolol (Inderal), a beta blocker medicine that is used to treat high blood pressure and angina. Theophylline: This asthma medicine may not be as effective in the presence of cigarette smoke. Smoking also may adversely affect the course of certain diseases such as ulcers, high blood pressure, diabetes, angina, and circulation problems.

Views On Dental Health Mothers Linked to Decay Research with human DNA has shown that mothers with poor dental hygiene can pass cavity-causing bacteria on to their infants. Transmission of the bacteria can lead to dental problems by the time infants break their first teeth. In short, parents practice good oral hygiene, their children often develop lower cavities. Mothers, who typically have the most contact with babies, are identified as the transmitter of dental cavity bacteria. The practice of blowing on babies' food or thermal taste testing may be the most common cause of bacteria transmission, researchers say. The study, which was carried out in Sweden, showed that by the time children reached the age of three, only 20% in the group of mothers with good dental habits were infected with bacteria by the group of mothers with high numbers of bacteria who did not practice good oral hygiene.
