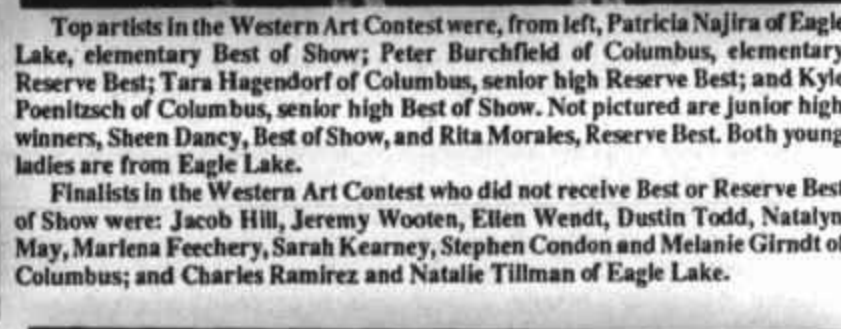

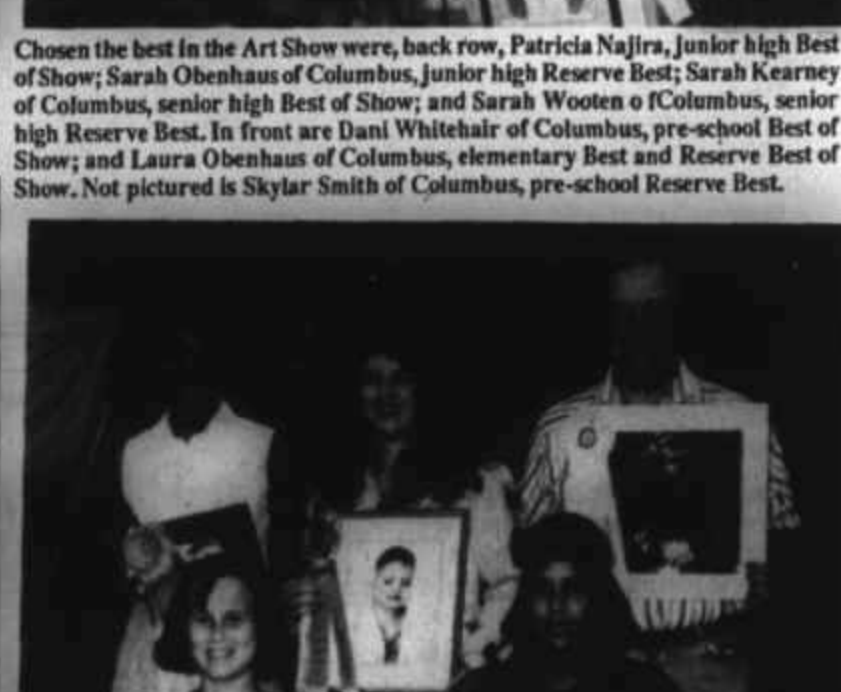

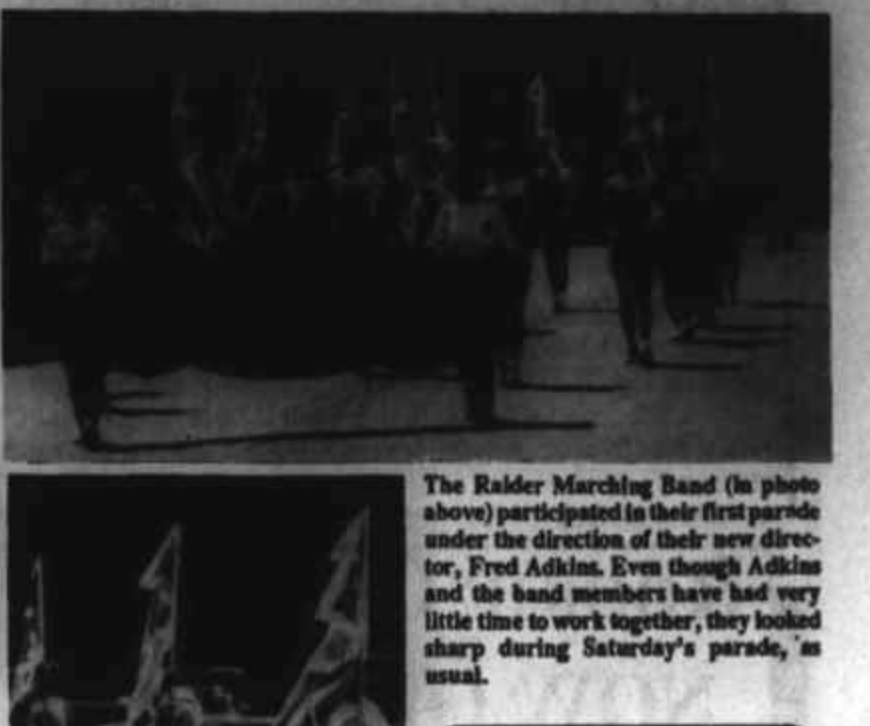
Parade, Competition & Just Plain Fun!
