Area: Effective prayer in ministry. Effective means bring the result into focus, shining a light by making a strong impression.

First week, basic theme: "Love and Praise for God", 1 John 4:19.

The Apostle Paul was Jesus' closest earthly friend. He was the only disci-

ple that saw Jesus three ways. The key note of all this writing is about "love". He wrote that Christians might believe that Christ is real. Love was John's favorite theme. Love is a divine gift, (John 3:16), the message of love must be preached in the power of the Holy Spirit.

Second week: "Thanksgiving and Reverence", Colossians 2:7

King David said, Psalms 100:4, "Enter into His gates with thanksgiving, and into His courts with praise, be thankful into Him, and bless His name."

No longer do we have to depend on earthly priest, to determine our relationship with God. Now that the Holy Spirit came down, on the day of Pentecost (Acts 2:1), and indwelt within the heart of our minds, we can experience a personal relationship with God without our supplication being funnelled through someone else, who is just as human and frail as we are.

We are to come in reverence thanking God for what He has done, is doing and will do, in our lives and the lives of others. In the present of the Almighty God, there is no room for self.

David closed the 100 Psalm by saying (verse 5), "For the Lord is good. His mercy is everlasting and His truth endureth to all generations."

Third week: "Confession and Forgiveness", 1 John 1:9

Confess means to admit a fault or crime. Forgiveness means to be pardoned. Pardon means, being free from further punishment.

1 John 1:9 declares that "If we confess our sins, (evil doings), He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."

John said in verse 10, if we say that we have not sinned, we make Him a liar and His word is not in us. Let's set our priority in order. Just because our names are on a local church membership role, do not bear-out. That it's written in blood, on the Lamb's book of life.

When we come into realization that we are truly a member of Christ's body and are bearing spiritual fruits and the first one is love, then our homes, churches, schools and communities will not cause us to feel as if

- Doctors recommend this three-step early detection program: schedule regular mammograms, your first screening by age 40, one every year or two to age 49, and one every year after 50; perform monthly breast self-examination, your doctor can show you the proper method; and, see your health care provider for regular breast examinations, at least every three years until age 40, then every year.
- Oct. is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month, a good time to get the facts.

- This month, Rice District Community Hospital is offering a mammogram for only \$25.

Views On Dental Health

SOME CALCIUM FACTS

A key nutrient to dental health is calcium. Children and adolescents need extra calcium to ensure the formation of strong, healthy teeth. Pregnant women need extra calcium to ensure the development of their unborn babies' teeth.

The need for extra calcium diminishes after adolescence but emerges again later in life. In fact, calcium deficiency is one of the major causes of osteoporosis, a disease characterized by loss of bone density. Osteoporosis affects 25 percent of women over 65 and 10 percent of men. The end result is brittle bones that break easily. Some researchers believe that osteoporosis of the jawbone may cause tooth loss and problems in fitting dentures.

Dairy products are by far the richest sources of calcium. Fruits and vegetables all contain some calcium, especially kale, collard greens, and spinach. Canned salmon and sardines with edible bones are also excellent sources. Calcium supplements can also be purchased over the counter.
