Jesse Bishop had two catches for 23 yards and one touchdown. He also had two PAT kicks.

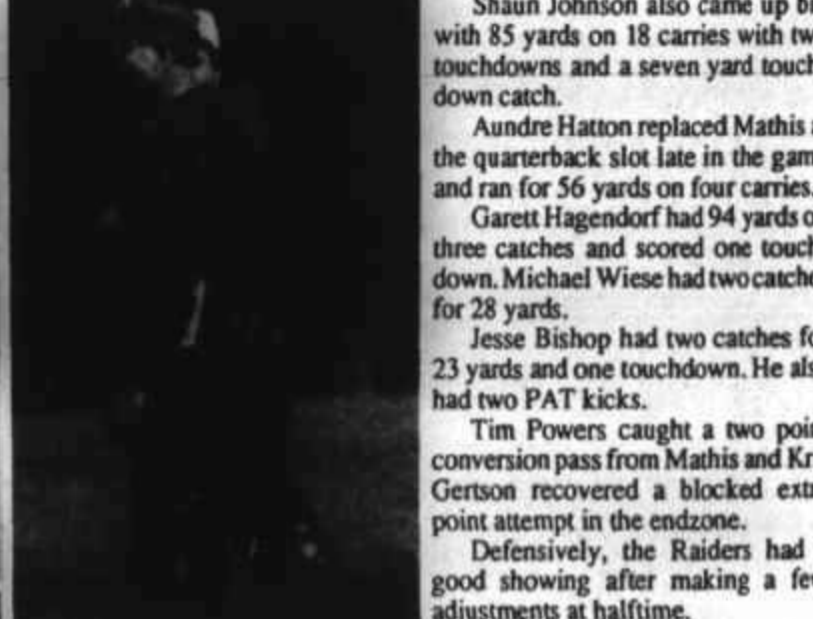
Tim Powers caught a two point conversion pass from Mathis and Kris Gertson recovered a blocked extra point attempt in the endzone.

**Migratory waterfowl pre-season meeting**

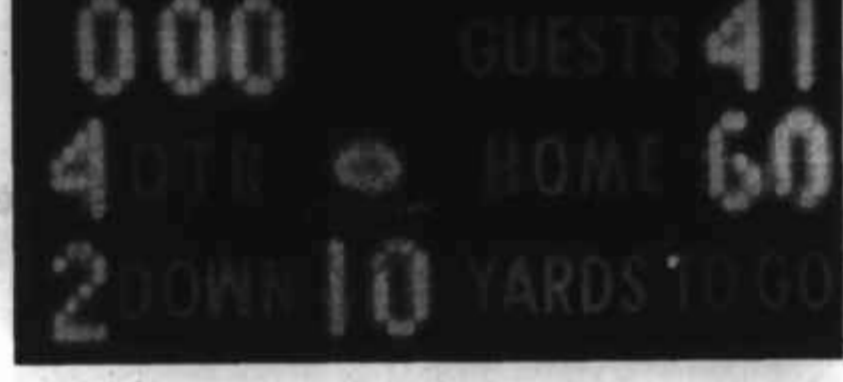

## County delays drug testing decision

Representatives of Pinnacle Employee Testing Service of Houston presented Colorado County Commissioners with its random drug and alcohol testing program on Monday morning, but the County opted to delay a decision on implementing a local program until other options could be studied.

According to the Omnibus Employee Testing Act of 1994, all companies, including county government, with fewer than 50 employees who operate with a commercial driver's licenses (CDL) in their employment, must adopt policy and procedures to conduct random drug testing by Jan. 1.

Pinnacle's cost is \$62.50 per employee. However, Dr. Harold Graves of Pinnacle said there was no way to determine a cost for pre-employment, reasonable suspicion or post-accident tests, but those services would be provided at a reasonable fee.

The Houston-based company, which has a number of local counties and school districts under contract, also would provide the County with policy assistance and regulations updates on a regular basis to assure that any changes or additions to federal and state regulations.

It also would provide all documentation required by the Texas Department of Transportation, including updating drive lists and administering the random selection.

According to Commissioners, there are approximately 24 CDL employees in the County which would result in a minimum of 12 drug tests and six alcohol tests per year.

"This is a random test so it is possible some employees will be tested more than once and others not at all," said Graves. "We call this 'random hell' in that when an employee is selected from the pool time and time again it appears that they are being picked on by that Commissioner."

"However, it is our position to protect their rights. They are not happy, but at least they are happier in (See Commissioners, Page 12)
