River discussed at 'town meeting'

More than 50 attended the Lower Colorado River Authority (LCRA) Town Hall meeting in the Veterans' Hall of Columbus on Monday, Oct. 16. The public meeting was open for people to express their concerns about any Colorado River problems. The first and major question was about the chance of San Antonio's taking water from the Colorado River for its future supplies. Other main subjects covered landfills and water-quality studies on Cummins Creek.

Mark Rose, LCRA's general manager, laid out the potential effects of San Antonio's growing demands for water on Coastal Plains farmers.

"No one doubts that there are some big court fights ahead," Rose said. "But, it won't just be San Antonio; Corpus Christi will also need water in the future," Rose said.

"This problem isn't going to go away, and it's one that digging your heels won't solve. We need to be looking now at solutions that will cause the least harm to our basin."

Rose stressed that the LCRA does not own the water in the Colorado River. "The Legislature gave us the mandate to manage the water, but it belongs to the State of Texas, and it will be the State that decides whether there will be interbasin transfers or not," he said. The Legislative Act creating the LCRA stipulates that the LCRA cannot transfer water outside the Colorado River Basin.

If San Antonio were allowed to get 125,000 to 150,000 acre-feet annually from the lower Colorado River, rice farmers relying on the river water would have significantly less water, according to Rose. Municipal needs have the highest priority for water; agricultural interests are third on the priority list.

Rose said that although San Antonio could receive court permission to use water from the Colorado and other Central Texas rivers, it appears that the fight will not be on surface water from rivers or reservoirs; it will be on groundwater (well water).

San Antonio owns about 10,000 acres of land over a major aquifer in

Bastrop County. This land was bought many years ago for lignite mining, but has not yet been developed. Buying more ground water would be the easiest way for the city to get supplies. "It takes about 20 years to build a reservoir, and that's too far way to meet the projected growth needs," Rose said. Installing pumps over aquifers and laying a pipeline are much quicker.

In the future, all water users are going to have to look at ways to recycle water and solve water supply problems on a regional basis, Rose stated.

Regardless of where San Antonio will get its water, it will be required to initiate a strong conservation program and switch from its cheap-rate policy to pay for the new water supplies.

Rose also stated that the LCRA will continue monitoring the Laidlaw (Altair) Environmental Services (formerly "Tricil") discussions on the possibility of developing a hazardous waste site near Altair.

Several participants at the meeting expressed concerns about LCRA's gathering water quality information on Cummins Creek, a tributary of the Colorado River. Dennis Daniel of LCRA's Environmental Protection group explained that the purpose of the project is to get a baseline reading on the quality of water in Cummins Creek. They are not looking for endangered species.

Such baselines give LCRA a technical basis to support efforts to continue to keep the Colorado clean.
