'Memory Walk 1995' to be Saturday, Nov. 4

The Colorado County leg of Memory Walk 1995, the only nationwide event of its kind for Alzheimer's disease, is set to begin at 8 a.m. Saturday, Nov. 4, at the Eagle Lake Middle School with similar events scheduled for Houston and Brenham.

Proceeds from this fun-filled family event, being sponsored by the Eagle Lake and Columbus Pilot Clubs, help support local services and benefit the more than 40,000 Alzheimer's patients living in the 18-county territory served by the Greater Houston Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association.

Registration fees are \$15 for youths, 14 and under, and \$20 for everyone 15 and older.

In addition to getting the opportunity to participate in this awareness-raising event, all registrants will receive a three-color commemorative t-shirt and a goody bag filled with giveaways from area retailers.

Following the walk, a festive after-party will take place featuring delicious food and beverages.

The Greater Houston Chapter, whose territory includes Colorado County, is one of 200 Alzheimer's Association chapters located in communities across all 50 states participating in this nationwide event.

The combined goal is to raise \$6.75 million to help fight Alzheimer's disease and provide support and adoptions services to Alzheimer's families in their community.

Memory Walk 1995 is the Greater Houston Chapter's largest annual fund raiser with participants being encouraged to raise funds in addition to entry fees.

This year's top prize to the individual who raises the most money is a design-you-won-dream-vacation for two to anywhere Southwest Airlines flies.

Other prizes for top fund raisers include a color television, golf for four at Walden on Lake Houston, an environmental air filtration system, golf lessons with a PGA professional and much more.

Door prizes will also be awarded during the after-party.

Locally, the Alzheimer's Association sponsors an Awareness Group for families wishing to learn more about the disease and providing the best possible care for loved ones stricken with it.

The Chapter also provides telephone support, information and referral via its toll-free HELPLINE, 1-800-526-3752.

Additional programs include financial assistance to help families purchase respite care, a speakers bureau comprised of professionals and caregivers alike, and a lending library filled with books, tapes and cassettes with important information about the disease and giving care.

The Alzheimer's Association is the only national voluntary health organization dedicated to funding research for the causes, treatments, prevention and cures of Alzheimer's disease, and to providing support to the four million Americans with the disease, their families and caregivers.

The trial begins its session on Tues. Oct. 24, 1995 at 10:05 a.m. in the Rice High School meeting room.

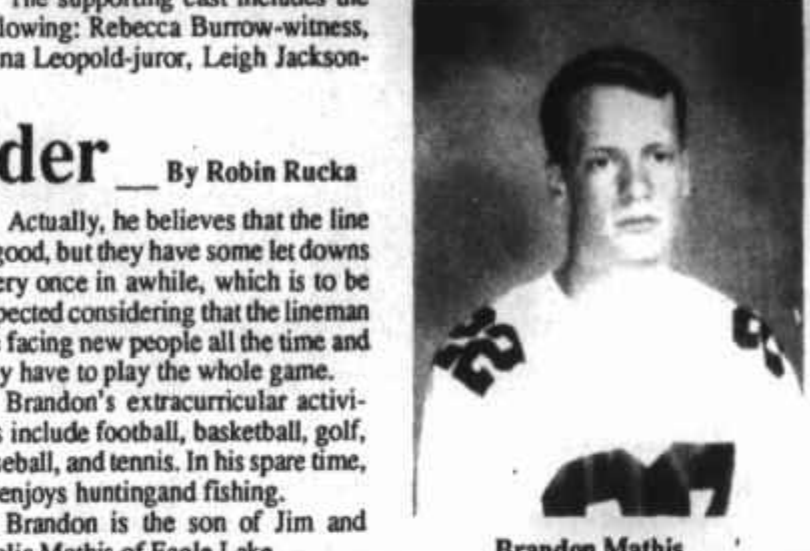

Flu shots

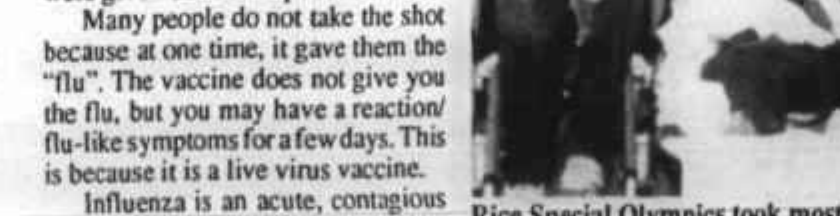

On Tuesday, Oct. 24, the Thomas Clinic and Rice District Community Hospital provided flu shots for all adult Rice CISD staff members. Shots were given on all campuses.

Many people do not take the shot because at one time, it gave them the "flu". The vaccine does not give you the flu, but you may have a reaction/flu-like symptoms for a few days. This is because it is a live virus vaccine.

Influenza is an acute, contagious respiratory infection characterized by sudden onset, fever, chills, cough, cold symptoms, headache, and muscular pain. It lasts for 4-5 days and is most prevalent in winter and spring. Young adults, in robust health, appear to be particularly susceptible. Those with chronic illnesses should definitely receive the vaccine.

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Ulcer Medicine May Help Treat Viral Warts

Warts are caused by a human virus called a papillomavirus (HPV). About 10 percent of the population is affected, with children and young adults most commonly involved. Warts are more common in females than in males. The elderly are rarely affected by warts. Nongenital warts include common, planar, and flat warts. Common warts develop around the fingernails and on the knees. Plantar warts develop on the bottom of the feet. Flat warts are most commonly observed on the back of the hands or on the neck or face.

Non-drug wart treatment in the physician's office often consists of cryotherapy (wart is frozen with liquid nitrogen and removed) or surgical removal by a laser. Most topical nonprescription medicines for wart removal contain salicylic acid.

A new approach to wart treatment is with the use of oral medicines that stimulate the immune system. The treatment is called immunotherapy, and the medicine that is receiving a lot of attention is cimetidine (Tagamet), a stomach acid blocking drug that has been used to treat gastric ulcers. The theory is that some persons who have warts also have T-cell defects in their immune systems. Supposedly, suppressor T-cells are inhibited by cimetidine. This action of cimetidine may make the immune system stronger.

HOW TO WRITE AN OBITUARY FOR YOUR TEENAGER.

YOU sit and watch your child sleep. The hospital intercom serves as a constant reminder of where you are. You tuck in the blanket around his feet. He hasn't moved since you last tucked it in, but it gives you something to do. It's been two days since your child's friends carried him into the emergency room. The doctor says it's a losing battle. You're not ready for that.

It's been 16 hours since your child was pronounced dead. The relatives you phoned didn't know about inhalants. It seems no one did. You haven't slept in two days but somehow, you keep going. Because you have a funeral to arrange. And people to console. And someone from the obituary section is on the phone. They need to know about the child you just lost.

When the hospital called, you thought it was a minor cut, another broken collarbone. The hospital nurse mentioned inhalants. That was a mistake, you thought. But you soon learned "sniffing" - inhaling household products to get high - was not a mistake. It was a habit. A habit that could've started with over 100 ordinary, everyday products like markers, correction fluid and spray paint. A habit that makes paraphernalia out of socks, soda cans, lunch bags. A habit that can damage the brain, heart.

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
