The protein average was 8.1%. Fifty-eight people were present for the program presented by David Bade, Extension Forage Specialist, on producing and utilizing quality hay in conjunction with winter pastures.
The grand champion sample of perennial grass was submitted by Tim Carnes. This sample of coastal bermuda tested 13.4% crude protein.
The grand champion annual grass was submitted by Fester Bros. Their ryegrass tested 10.2% crude protein. Plaques for champion entries were donated by Heffley's Mill & Grain and M-G Farm Service Center.
Each sample of hay submitted was tested for protein at a reduced cost by producers. Knowing protein content helps with plans for winter supplemental feeding.

Council hears about proposed City Park, problems with noisy chickens

Eagle Lake Mayor Robby Cook unveiled a conceptual design for a municipal park for the City of Eagle Lake at the last week's meeting of City Council.
Cook told Council that City Manager Ron Holland and he have been looking for some time at the feasibility of applying for a Texas Parks and Wildlife Department grant through the Texas Recreation and Parks Act program to allow the City to have a municipal park.
The grant will fund up to \$1 million with a 50% match from the City.
According to Cook, the City's goal will be to receive as much of its share to the match in the way of land donations, in-kind work and cash contributions as possible.
The actual dollar amount of the grant will depend on the value of the land to be donated for the park and other in-kind donations.
Council approved the formation of a park board consisting of Cook, Helen Craig, Susan Tomcheson, Olivia Maxie and Larry Contreras.
The board will be appointed every two years by the mayor with Council approval. The board will serve in an advisory capacity and make suggestions to the mayor and Council for the purpose of park system planning. (For an in-depth explanation of the park, what it will contain and where it will be located, see "Mayor Cook explains" on Page 6.)
Council heard a request from Lila Armstrong asking that the present ordinance which controls fowl in the City limits be replaced and a cat ordinance be adopted.
"A crowing rooster is a country noise and I don't feel it necessary in the year 1995 to have chickens in the City limits... seven blocks from City Hall. I want an ordinance that completely outlaws any fowl that makes noises in the city limit," said Armstrong. "My rights are being violated and I can't sleep."
Armstrong was critical of the Eagle Lake Police Department for not taking her "crowing rooster" problem seriously and demanded an apology from Police Chief Keith Webb.
Webb apologized to Armstrong for whatever reason she felt she should, but produced documentation of the order he issued to his officers to treat all calls from Armstrong seriously and monitor the noise.
Daily activity sheets were presented showing officers did document times the roosters crowed and took measurements of distance of the chicken pens from Armstrong's residence.
Cook questioned Armstrong if the matter was a widespread problem in the whole neighborhood or just "two neighbors who can't get along?" Documentation by Webb showed no other complaints from residents in the neighborhood.
Webb told Council a citation has been issued to the owner of the roosters and the case was to have been heard in municipal court on Tuesday.
It was the consensus of Council that the matter be settled through the judicial system.
It was reported that City Attorney Don Bandy dropped the charges since the case was filed under the local noise ordinance and was not in the spirit of the ordinance.
The fowl ordinance approved in Sept. 1960 will be reviewed by Council to see if it is reasonable. The feasibility of a cat ordinance and a pound for stray cats as is now done with stray dogs also will be studied.
Council granted a probation raise to Webb following an executive session to evaluate his job performance as chief of police. His six-month new employee probation was complete as of Nov. 12.
The raise brought Webb's salary up to \$30,000 annually.
Upon reconvening into open session, the evaluation was very positive, according to Cook.
"I think I echo the sentiment of the other Council members when I tell the chief he's done one heck of a job for the City and we appreciate it. The goals he has set for the police department are a step in the right direction," said Cook.
In other business, Council
-Cancelled the Dec. 26 Council meeting due to Christmas;
-Approved an application by Marvin Duddleston for a building permit within the fire zone to construct a new awning over sidewalk at 217 E. Main; and
-Granted the mayor authority to sign a memorandum of agreement between the City of Eagle Lake and L.W.Jr. and Emily Stiles for the trade of real estate for the airport expansion project.
