Sometimes, however, flat feet can be caused by such events as a physical injury, rheumatoid arthritis, or an neurological disease. In such cases, the result is often painful and debilitating. Fortunately, we've come a long way since a diagnosis of flat feet meant clomping awkwardly around in cumbersome corrective shoes. A new generation of orthotics (prescription footwear inserts) can offer comfortable relief and support, yet are compact enough that patients' footwear does not broadcast to the world that they have problem feet.

P.S. If they don't get help, people with flat feet often tire easily when walking or find walking uncomfortable.



> There are two types of diabetes - insulin dependent (type I) and noninsulin dependent (type II). Type I diabetes is the most common endocrine deficiency experienced during childhood. Daily subcutaneous insulin injections are required for children and adults with this condition because of a defect in the area of the pancreas that produces insulin. Injections are necessary since insulin is not active when given orally.

> Insulin helps regulate blood levels of carbohydrate (glucose). If too much insulin is given, the person may become faint and start shaking or sweating. The remedy is to get glucose into the body by eating candy or drinking sweetened soft drinks. On the other hand, if too little insulin is given, the person may become drowsy. If this condition is not corrected (with insulin), the person could go into a coma. The treatment is more complicated and should involve a physician. A suspected diabetic coma should be handled as a medical emergency.


In 1994, the American Diabetes Association issued new standards of care for reducing the medical complications of type I diabetes. These include multiple daily insulin injections, careful attention to diet, strict monitoring of blood glucose three or four times a day, and regular exercise.
