LEONARD HOWARD "LEN" SEAHOLM died one year ago at sunset on April 9, 1995, in Dallas, Texas. He was born on November 21, 1919, in Eagle Lake, Texas, the eldest son of Gustav A. Seaholm and Johanna Lou Waddell Seaholm. He completed primary and secondary education in Eagle Lake, Texas, and majored in chemistry at the University of Texas at Austin earning his Bachelors degree before enlisting in the Army Air Corps in 1942. He earned his navigational wings, was assigned to a B-17 crew and was stationed with the 42nd Squadron in southern Italy for the duration of the war in Europe. He received the Purple Heart, the Distinguished Flying Cross, and the Air Medal with two Oak Leaf Clusters. He was discharged in 1945 at the rank of First Lieutenant. He retired in 1985 from work as a sales manager at a wholesale plant nursery. Earlier, his professional life included work as an engineer, pharmaceutical salesmen, and production manager. A man of many talents and interests, he was admired for his subtle wit, his love of knowledge and classical music, his colorful and fragrant garden, his twinkling blue eyes and his exuberant appreciation of life. He was a member of St. John's Episcopal Church. He is survived by his wife of 47 years, Ruth Thomas Seaholm; his younger brother, Gardner A. Seaholm; his daughter, Megan Seaholm; son-in-law, Greg Cantrell; and his granddaughter, Ellen Seaholm Cantrell. He was preceded in death by his son, Per Seaholm. He is mourned by dozens of friends, neighbors, and relatives who enjoyed his affable good nature, his generosity, and until his last illness, his ready smile and warm handshake. Len Seaholm was enthralled by natural beauty, especially the beauty of flowers. He was also ever aware of those less fortunate than himself. Thus, in lieu of flowers, his family requests that any memorial donations be made to his favorite charity, the Salvation Army. A graveside memorial service and interment of his ashes will be held at Lakeside Cemetery in Eagle Lake, Texas, on Saturday, April 20, 1996, 3:00 p.m., the Reverend Delorah Doudson Parsons officiating. Obsessive Compulsive Disorder Treatment

Obsessive compulsive disorder (OCD) is the occurrence of persistent thoughts (obsessions) and repetitive behaviors (compulsions). The most common obsessions involve fears of being contaminated or hurt in some manner. OCD often involves thoughts of dreaded diseases, food poisoning, or radiation contamination. Associated behaviors might include washing one's hands repetitively or taking excessive precautions to protect oneself.
OCD may sound like a condition that affects only a few persons. However, according to a recent report in a Scandinavian psychiatry journal, as many as three of every 100 persons will be affected at sometime during their lives. This means that almost 8 billion Americans will suffer from OCD at some point. The report indicated that OCD is the fourth most common psychiatric disorder (the phobias, substance abuse, and major depression are more common). The outcome or prognosis has improved in recent years due to recognition of the disorder and early treatment.

Treatment generally includes behavior modification and drug therapy. Medicines used to treat OCD includes those that make more serotonin available at nerve endings. Prescription medicines that have this effect clomipramine, fluoxetine, fluvoxamine, and sertraline.
