## Morales continues war on tobacco industry

Attorney General Dan Morales continued to wage war on the tobacco industry last week when he suggested Texas sell more than \$500 million in tobacco stocks it holds in its pension and endowment funds.

"Texas should be in business with those who seek to do our children harm. Our state should repudiate its financial involvement in these unconscionable efforts to profiteer at the expense of our children's lives," Morales told the *Dallas Morning News*.

But Jack Maroney, an attorney for Philip Morris, Inc., a defendant in the lawsuit, characterized Morales' plea to dump tobacco stocks as "another attack on business."

In late March, Morales filed suit against the tobacco industry on federal racketeering charges.

Last week, Morales wrote letters requesting the self-off of the Teachers Retirement System, the Employees Retirement System, the Permanent University and the Permanent School Fund, the *Morning News* reported.

Morales spokesman Don Dusek said the attorney general was obligated to tell the state funds that "tobacco stock will plummet" as a result of litigation against the industry, and that his letters were made public because his advice could affect the stock market.

The largest investor in tobacco stocks of the four funds is the Teacher Retirement System, which holds \$413 million.

Also last week, State Board of Education chairman Jack Christy of Houston said the 1-member panel would meet this week and discuss Morales' request to sell tobacco stock in the Permanent School Fund, which the board oversees, the *Houston Chronicle* reported.

Christy told the Chronicle he believes it is morally wrong for the state to invest education dollars in tobacco stocks. "On one hand we're telling the kids (smoking) is evil, and on the other hand we're taking the tobacco industry's profits."

Other Capital Highlights

Austin had the biggest increase in violent crime in the nation from 1994 to 1995 among the 73 cities with a population of at least 200,000, according to the FBI and U.S. census. Violent crimes reported during the period, including murder, rape, robbery and aggravated assault, increased from 3,249 to 4,050, or 24.65%.

Austin could become the first major city in the United States to require all bicyclists to wear protective helmets under a proposed helmet law.

Thirteen states and many counties and cities have bike helmet laws, but most of those laws only require children to wear helmets, according to the Bicycle Federation of America.

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resulted in allegations of overcharging. Policyholders of Allstate and Farmers have a lawsuit pending in a South Texas state court alleging the companies have overcharged customers more than \$100 million over the last decade.

Spokesmen for Allstate and Farmers said the companies would comply with Bomer's order.

Bomer has acknowledged that the insurance companies were misinformed by state regulators about how to calculate premiums.

In other news, Bomer adopted a fraud-prevention policy that requires new insurance agents to be fingerprinted and submit to criminal background checks.

Bomer said that every year consumers are defrauded by a few agents who would not have been issued a license if they had disclosed their criminal records to the Texas Department of Insurance.

The policy will go into effect this summer.

## Reed guest speaker at President's Luncheon

On Friday, May 10, the Eagle Lake Study Club held their annual President's Luncheon with the theme "Making a Difference."

Rev. Larry Bailey gave the invocation and Elaine Hess introduced the different committees and all who made the program possible. Hess then introduced the guest speaker, Deborah Reed.

Reed spoke to the guests, close to 100, about the Holocaust which her family had survived.

Hess closed the program by saying "May we always remember to be good to one another." The Study Club then presented Deborah with a gift for being their speaker.

The following is the speech given by Reed:

I thank you most sincerely for doing me the honor of inviting me to address the annual President's Luncheon. For a long time, I have sought a means of telling my and my parent's unique history to my newly acquired community, friends and family, as it was important to me that you would come to know the extraordinary events and people that have shaped me. And this is indeed an auspicious forum in which to do so.

As a very small child, from my earliest recollections I sensed that something was terribly wrong - that a dreadful, dark secret lurked in my home. For most children, the boogie man is not real, does not exist, and goes away when the lights are turned on or morning comes.

In my home, the boogie man was real and lived in my parent's nightmares and the constant oppressive presence of memories too terrible to be spoken and too overwhelming to be left behind.

The Holocaust was my boogie man, and as I came to know more and more of my family's history, I came increasingly to understand that the Holocaust is my history too, and its lessons are one for all mankind.

"Why did my mother write on her arm?" a little friend of mine inquired "that your phone number? Can't she remember it?" I had never thought anything about the tattooed numbers on my mother's arm. My aunt had them and so did my father's friends - wasn't it normal? And what were these "grandparents" that so many of my kindergarten friends talked about? How come they got to go on vacation with them, and had such fun with them? Why didn't I have any grandparents? These were my first questions to my parents about our family's history, and cannot even imagine how they must have dreaded having to answer me.

On Sept. 1, 1939, the German army invaded Poland and World War II began. Within two weeks, the Polish government surrendered. During those two weeks, my father and his two brothers traveled to Warsaw to try to defend Poland against the Germans - to no avail.

Most Jews of Poland saw the Nazi invasion and threat as merely another anti-Semitic episode in the long history of anti-Semitism that characterized Jewish life in Europe. "And we will overcome this episode." (See Reed, Page 4)
