**Attwater's Prairie Chickens being hatched**

The Attwater's Prairie Chicken National Wildlife Refuge recently provided Attwater's Prairie Chicken eggs to the San Antonio Zoo for its captive breeding and reintroduction program.

San Antonio's Curator Russell Smith said "it's pretty exciting!" There are currently only 42 Attwater's Prairie Chickens in the world. Texas' southern most grouse has been in danger of becoming extinct and is the most endangered bird in the United States.

Without the captive breeding program, we would probably see the birds become extinct within the next few years.

"Refuge biologists trapped and radio tagged two hens which is how they found the rare eggs," Smith said.

The females from the clutch will join two adult male birds that were captured in April in Refugio County. The four will form the nucleus of the breeding program.

The zoo is working with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, Houston Zoo, Fossil Rim Wildlife Center and Texas A&M University in a recovery, breeding and reintroduction program.

So far this spring, more than 360 eggs have been produced at the four breeding facilities.

Wildlife officials plan to release 100 to 150 of these young birds in late July and Aug. on the Attwater's Prairie Chicken National Wildlife Refuge located 7 miles from Eagle Lake.

This is what the young Attwater's Prairie Chickens will look like when successfully hatched at the San Antonio Zoo.

The need for blood during the summer months remains constant while donations traditionally do not. Most of the blood collected in the Gulf Coast region comes from church and business sponsored blood drives. However, during the summer months, lower attendance by members and employees of these organizations means fewer blood donations.

High schools and universities also have strong blood donor programs for their faculty and students during the traditional school year, but they are not in full session during the summer and therefore do not sponsor blood drives.

Eighty percent of the blood collected comes from mobile blood drives sponsored by these churches, businesses and schools.

Because there are fewer donors during the summer, many of the groups do not want to sponsor summer blood drives. They would rather put their efforts into a project that would receive full participation during the school year.

Additionally, the summer months begin with Memorial Day, end with Labor Day, and have the 4th of July right in the middle. Each of these holidays bring with it an increased need for blood because of an increase in travel, automobile accidents, crime-related injuries and organ transplant surgeries that are due to an availability of organs. Many other elective surgeries are also scheduled during the summer while students, teachers and others have time off.

The resulting summer shortages of blood are a national problem, not just a local one.

When stock levels of blood are low, it is difficult to receive help from other centers. It is for these reasons that the Gulf Coast Regional Blood Center seeks the support of many region-wide organizations to sponsor special blood drives during the historically low-draw summer months.

We also encourage our faithful donor groups to sponsor an extra drive in the summer, even if only half of the number of donors are able to attend. The need for blood is that important, that constant and that critical.
