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## Thomas Clinic offers chickenpox vaccine

The Thomas Clinic, a local family practice, is now offering the chickenpox vaccine to area residents.

Nearly four million Americans get chickenpox each year. Approximately 90% of cases occur in children 1 to 14 years of age, with about 2% of cases occurring in adults. Elementary school children have the highest risk of infection, with 50% to 60% of cases occurring in children between the ages of 5 and 9.

Chickenpox, a disease characterized by a rash, is caused by the varicella zoster virus. In addition to the rash, which may spread into the mouth or other internal parts of the body,

symptoms of chickenpox include achiness, fever, irritability, and itching. The disease is spread via airborne routes like coughing or sneezing, making it contagious. Because chickenpox is spread so easily, a person who has not had the disease can easily catch it by being exposed to someone who is infected.

Chickenpox runs its course like this: after exposure, a 2 to 3 week incubation period follows, meaning it takes 2 to 3 weeks before symptoms begin.

About a day before the telltale rash appears, the infected person may begin to feel achy and feverish, doesn't

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**Views On Dental Health**

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You can move away from your mother-in-law, but periodontal disease may stay with you for life. Most people do not realize that periodontal (gum) disease is the major cause of tooth loss in adults. It is inflammation of the soft tissues surrounding teeth - the gums or gingivae - and can eventually destroy the bone surrounding the roots of the teeth. (Children are not immune, periodontal disease often begins in childhood.)

The major culprit appears to be plaque, a sticky, almost invisible film that builds up on the teeth. Plaque gets acidic and even more destructive after you eat sugar or starchy foods. Warning signs of possible periodontal problems:

- bleeding gums when you clean your teeth; bad breath; soft, swollen or tender gums; pus from the gum line on pressing; loose teeth; gums shrinking away from the teeth; any change in the way your teeth come together.

To protect, arrange for plaque removal by your dentist on a scheduled basis. Follow hygienic advice on brushing, flossing, rinsing, diet. Good oral hygiene is essential to protect against periodontal problems.

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# Rookies, Clippers remain tied after splitting two

Clippers too hot to handle in Game 1

The Rookies and Shiner Clippers split a doubleheader on Sunday, June 16, offering an afternoon of entertaining baseball on a scorching Father's Day afternoon. A split with the finest pitching staff in the SCTL is considered adequate.

The Clippers possess remarkable depth in the pitching department, with three hurlers in the starting rotation attending Sam Houston State University.

Daniel Boedecker beat the Rookies in the first game 6-1. His performance was by far the finest the Rookies have faced this season, allowing them only four hits.

Once again the opener was battery-made Shane Lechler and Jody Domel. Lechler's performance on the mound wasn't his finest, but certainly was good enough to win had the Rookies put the bat on the ball. Three of six runs were unearned due to costly errors.

Lechler has yet to show problems with his control, again allowing few walks (three) in the full seven innings. He lacked his high, fast ball strikeout pitch, acquiring only one "K", probably due to the fatiguing heat.

Lechler clipped fewer Clippers at the plate than his average outing. He normally runs his fast ball in tight throughout the game, but Sunday the pulsating sun forced him to throw every pitch close to the plate, keeping his pitch count down.

The Rookies offered no real scoring threat throughout the contest. For the first time of the season, they were unable to utilize their well-respected

inning were unearned, with the ground-ball boots and errant throws being responsible for both.

The other end of the battery was, as always, lanky, determined Matt Faldyn. Faldyn was responsible for Massey's ability to pitch out of a jam on several occasions, calling the right pitches and keeping Massey's composure after the Rookie mistakes.

Like the Lechler/Domel battery, the Massey/Faldyn connection continues to work well together and produce games in the win column. The Rookie receivers (Domel and Faldyn) continue to be respected throughout the league. Managers obviously consider the arms of the duo to be deadly, with the Rookie catchers having faced the fewest steal attempts in the league.

Although the Rookie defense played below par, their bats were loaded. They played their normal offensive game by smacking the ball and sprinting the base paths. Rice crossed pay seven times on 11 hits, defeating the Clippers 7-5.

Shiner was forced to call upon their entire pitching staff throughout the Rookie hitting barrage. The Clippers started flame-throwing Jeremy Debrian, but to his surprise, the Rookie bats thrive on the gas.

In Debrian's four innings on the mound, Rice scratched him for three runs. In the first, Machac clipped him with a triple to the right-field wall. Domel collected an RBI driving Machac home with a single. Faldyn also singled before the frame ended, but was left stranded.

Debrian held the Rookies scoreless through the second, but Machac nicked him again in the third. He led off the inning with a single, but Domel followed him with a ground ball to short, resulting in a "6U-3" double play.

The fourth led to Debrian's demise when Rice added two more nails to the coffin, with Kevin Gage and Chris Polak scoring.

Clipper hurler Curtis relieved Debrian in the bottom of the fifth frame, but was unable to finish the inning. He officially pitched 2/3 of an inning and was charged with four earned runs.

Machac and Domel opened with consecutive singles. With runners on first and second, no one out, and the score tied, Faldyn was called upon to sacrifice bunt. In the attempt, Curtis overthrew first base scoring Machac and leaving Domel at third, and Jeremy Gohke, courtesy runner for Faldyn, at second base. Gage then drove a single to center scoring both Domel and Gohke.

With two outs, the unidentified Phantom struck again.

After taking a called strike, the lefty drove an outside pitch to the left field corner. The ball bounced out of the corner, allowing Gage to score from first as the Phantom trotted easily into second base.

The Clippers were then forced to call upon the services of another member of their pitching arsenal. Ernie came into the game with two outs and was able to get the Clippers out of the inning when he forced Greg

Carerra to fly out to center, leaving the Phantom stranded at second.

That ended the Rookie scoring. Although Machac, who went four for four in the game, threatened with another single in the bottom of the sixth, his third hit of the game, they were unable to manufacture any further runs.

They remained on top of the Clippers after the top of the seventh so it was unnecessary for the Rookies to take their turn offensively at the plate.

The Rookies travel to Victoria on Sunday, June 23, hoping to broom the Gunslingers again.

With six games remaining in the regular season, the Rookies share second place with the Clippers with a record of 9-5, and two games behind the league-leading Bernardo Bears.
