Sales tax Continued from Page 1 June 1995 payment of \$5.3 million. The City of Ft. Worth's rebate of \$4 million was 31.8% more than the June 1995 payment of \$3 million, while the City of Arlington received \$3.6 million, 24.1% above the \$2.9 million delivered for the same period one year ago. The June sales tax rebate to El Paso was \$2.9 million, 3.5% more than the \$2.8 million payment in June 1995. Other cities in our area, the amount of their sales tax rebate this month along with the change from the same month last year are: Columbus*, \$47,094.15, +62.49%; Weimar, \$9,396.25, +44.01%; Sealy, \$48,106.57, +53.59%; Bellville, \$17,511.26, +52.92%; El Campo, \$129,209.60, +13.20%; and Wharton, \$80,798.38, up 29.75%. Year-to-date totals for the above cities are: Columbus, \$58,700.31, unable to calculate due to change in rate; Weimar, \$61,865.56, +8.79%; Sealy, \$331,774.04, up 46.44%; Bellville, \$113,602.55, up 2.14%; El Campo, \$785,362.02, +5.33%; and, Wharton, \$478,961.22, up 1.38%. On the county level, Colorado County's received \$45,501.22, +46.60% from last year's \$31,684.55; Austin County, \$59,675.26, +40.57%; Wharton County, \$90,175.46, +10.41%. Year-to-date totals for the above counties are: Colorado, \$265,035.11, +4.23%; Austin, \$354,122.43, +14.00%; Wharton, \$548,185.12, up 4.24%. The Comptroller's next allocation is scheduled for Friday, July 12. *This is the first month Columbus has received a check after they increased their town's portion from 1% to 1.5%, therefore, it is not an accurate comparison.

Council Continued from Page 1 coming from outside Eagle Lake to establish residence in the city. Esmor will conduct a local job fair for hiring purposes once the facility is constructed, possibly by the new year. The City of Eagle Lake's commitment to the project is payment of the consultant and purchase of the property. It was noted by Holland that the City will go through the bond process to purchase the land, but those bonds will not be tax-supported revenues. Holland presented Council with a copy of the City's dangerous building ordinance which provides a procedure to declare a building dangerous as well as notification of the owner to remove or repair the building. Holland was previously instructed by Council to study the ordinance after a group of concerned citizens presented asking that an abandoned house on Norris Street be cleaned up. The ordinance states, "Whenever the required demolition is not commenced within 30 days after the order, the city manager may cause the building or structure to be demolished and all debris removed from the premises." Holland told Council there are no provisions for fines, assessing costs to the property owner or for filling a lien on the property. Since the City does not have the equipment necessary to safely knock down a building or load the debris on to trucks and, since there are no necessary funds available to pay someone to do the job, Holland told Council a new ordinance, including penalties for failure to comply, needs to be developed. Council authorized Holland to proceed with the writing of a new ordinance. In other business, Council: •Tabled a bid in the amount of \$19,927 to provide police department computer hardware and software to be provided with LCRA grant funds, secured by Police Chief Keith Webb, for further study of prices; •Tabled a resolution authorizing Council members access to tapes of executive sessions in order to study the legality of such a resolution; •Authorized the mayor to write the Rice Consolidated School District concerning City participation in Youth Government Days and Career Days; •Granted a request to close Walnut Street between Main and Post Office on Sunday, June 30, for the Parish of the Nativity's annual picnic; and •Announced the home improvement grant application process will begin on June 26 with the applications being ranked according to need.

The cause of the painful condition, however, is actually found far from the feet, in the kidneys. There, the body processes uric acid, formed when the body breaks down waste products. SPARC Board considering water park in Sheridan

"Open with a splash!" was the advice given to the Board of Directors for Sheridan Park & Recreation Center Inc. (SPARC) in meetings with tourism consultants this past month. A new twist to possible plans for Sheridan Community Park include a water park with tube and body slides, zero-entry kiddie play area, a 15-foot wide by 600-foot long river with moving current. Feasibility studies by an independent company reflect a tremendous boost in tourism dollars and jobs for the entire County with such a water park facility in the Sheridan location. With the advent of possible expansion of Sheridan Community Park plans, more funds must be raised in the public and private sectors. Texas Parks and Wildlife grant funds will be used for the pool portion of the water park, but additional buildings and infrastructure will require Texas County Development Program funds through the Texas Capital Fund Program.

School Board looks at TAAS results

By Lynda Appelt, Contributing Writer TAAS performance were alarmingly weak. Weaknesses in some areas showed at Garwood and Sheridan with lots of problems at ELMS. The Eagle Lake Primary School showed gains and met all its district goals. "We made considerable gains throughout the District compared to last year, which is pleasing, but the problem areas must and will be analyzed and corrected. We must put more in place to remediate," said Gott. District strength and weaknesses, grade-by-grade, campus-by-campus, will be analyzed and a detailed report presented to the Board and public as a future agenda item. A computer TAAS study prepared by Gott was presented to each Board member for study in preparation for the future TAAS performance presentation. Following allegations of unfair bidding practices, nepotism and not getting "apples for apples," the Board approved three technology bids by NCS, represented at the meeting by Ron Gaunt, owner and general manager. Total cost for computer software and training for the business lab at Rice High School was \$38,826. Computer software and training to update the library at RHS was bid at \$49,191. Job No. 3, to create a computer lab for the Art Department at RHS, was bid at \$15,862. When Gott made the recommendation to accept the low bid by NCS on all three jobs, Sabertech representatives alleged that Gaunt's twin brother, who prepared the bid specifications for the district, is an employee of the district since he does technical engineering work at times for the district. It was also alleged NCS could not furnish a manufacturer's warranty and of the unfair bidding practices. (See Board, Page 10)

The passenger, Benjamin Cabrera, also of Eagle Lake, was also charged with possession of marijuana along with resisting search. Both subjects were processed at the police department then transported to CCDC for confinement. Sgt. Knox and Officer Keith Bailey were dispatched to B Street on June 23 in reference to the report of terroristic threat. A report was taken and the case is under investigation. A traffic stop in the 200 block of Boothe Drive on June 24 resulted in the arrest of the driver, Clarence Pickett of Eagle Lake, for driving while license suspended. Pickett was processed at the police department then transported to CCDC for confinement. Officer Rick was dispatched to the El Zorro Bar on June 24 in reference to a reported disturbance. After meeting with the complainant and witnesses, it was determined that no offense had occurred at this time. No further action was taken.

Committee suggests old jail be demolished

Colorado County Commissioners' Court received notice last Friday that the Old County Jail Committee had adopted a resolution to demolish the old County Jail in Columbus. Signed by members Helen Craig of Eagle Lake, Lil Stallman of Columbus and Jerry Vachala of Weimar, the resolution said, "We feel that due to the severe deterioration of the old jail, the most unsuitable use for any feasible office space and exorbitant cost in renovation, that the most cost effective alternative is demolition." The committee based its findings on a careful study of the structure and various cost estimates. According to County Judge Vince Slominski, the Court had received two earlier cost estimates for the jail's demolition. The lower of the two totaled approximately \$25,000. The Court also adopted a new rate scale for the Colorado County Emergency Medical Services upon the recommendation of EMS Director Marc Jordan. While the base rate will remain at \$125, the charge for Advanced Life Support (ALS), which the EMS is adding to its list of services, will be \$175. A basic transfer will climb from \$125 to \$150 while an ALS transfer will cost a patient \$275. There also will be an increase in mileage from \$2.50 to \$3.50 per mile, according to the rate scale. "We will have limited ALS services at this time. We will respond to all major accidents, as well as cardiac patients, and go from there in developing a strategy. It will be a step-by-step process," said Jordan. The EMS currently only have five ALS-certified personnel on its staff. "We are currently just manning one unit so we are very, very limited," repeated Jordan. "We will continue to operate on a limited basis until we are able to get more people trained. We simply don't know how many times we will be able to respond with the ALS service... we are a rural area with 9,678 square miles." Jordan also proposed a new pay scale for EMS personnel. The base rate, as well as transfer base rate, will remain at \$40 while the new ALS rate and transfer ALS rate are listed at \$25 and \$55, respectively. The pay scale for a disengaged ALS call will be \$10. In other business, the Court: •Announced that the County would seek its share of unclaimed monies through the state to be used for economic development; •Adopted amendments to the Personnel Policy Manual in regard to the pre-employment drug testing for commission drivers; •Tabled a decision on accepting qualifications for an architect for the new juvenile boot camp facility in Eagle Lake and engineer for the Al-Jetter sewer project for business hookups; •Approved a rider on the County's workers compensation insurance for Al-Jetter volunteer workers in regard to the community's sewer project; •Received notice that the boat ramp at the Colorado River bridge on U.S. Hwy. 90A between Eagle Lake and Altair, would be closed for reconstruction until July 15; •Were notified by Alamo Fireworks that the company had voluntarily removed aerial fireworks from its distributors' shelves for July 4; and •Received notice that the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department would no longer regulate the possession of various dangerous wild animals, such as lions, tigers and cougars, effective Sept. 1 and the County may want to establish its own regulatory program.
