# Morales files suit on 'Republic of Texas'

Texas Attorney General Dan Morales filed suit last week against the "Republic of Texas" accusing the group and 25 of its members of filing fraudulent liens, tampering with government records, interfering with property sales and restraining trade.

State District Judge Paul Davis of Travis County signed a temporary restraining order prohibiting the Republic of Texas or its 25 members from breaking the law or filing false claims.

The restraining order also allows the attorney general's office to undo liens without going to court.

The Republic of Texas members believe the state and its officials are acting without authority, and the group has created its own common-law courts, filed "charges" of sedition against Morales, Gov. George W. Bush and others.

**SSC Land to Be Resold**

Land bought by the federal government for the Superconducting Super Collider project - which lost its funding in 1993 - is going to be resold to the public.

The Texas Natural Resource Laboratory Commission and the Texas General Land Office are coordinating the resale of about 10,000 acres of land in Ellis County, south-east of Dallas. The federal government eventually gave the tracts of land to the state of Texas after the project was suspended.

General Land Office spokesman Ron Calhoun said the land sales will be done in a "systematic, prudent way" but people who lived on the land before it was taken over by the federal government will get no special privileges.

**Official Wants Tobacco Dumped**

State Board of Education Chair-

man Jack Christie sent a letter dated June 17 to the managers of the Permanent School Fund asking that they sell off any holdings in tobacco-producing companies.

"This is to let them know how a few of us feel," Christie told the *Dallas Morning News*.

"I find it incredible that we generate funds through investments in tobacco, which have to be used to educate students to avoid the very product that our investments support," Christie said in the letter.

The state filed a lawsuit March 31 against major tobacco companies, seeking \$4 billion for money spent on treating tobacco-related illnesses.

**Other Capital Highlights**

- The cost of providing ATM services is decreasing but Texans are paying more for them, according to the Texas Consumers Union. When a bank customer uses another bank's automated teller machine, 65 of 93 Texas banks surveyed charge fees of up to \$1.50 per transaction. The report urges the Texas Legislature to monitor ATM fees for a possible cap, or prohibition on the non-customer surcharge.

•Sixteen universities in the state have increased fees to the point that they exceed tuition, the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board said in a report to the House higher education subcommittee.

Rep. Steve Ogden, R-Bryan, vice chairman of the subcommittee, said the Legislature should try to simplify the fee structure "so parents have a better idea why they are paying so much and what the money is going for."

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**New Product May Curb PMS Symptoms**

While no one therapy seems to benefit all women with premenstrual syndrome (PMS), a number of prescription and nonprescription medicines have been helpful. Antiinflammatory drugs include *ibuprofen*, and *naproxen*. *Vitamin B-6* may help suppress production of prolactin, a hormone that is elevated in some PMS sufferers. Some women benefit from *progesterone* or oral contraceptive medicines. Water pills (*diuretics*) may help reduce fluid retention. Antidepressants may be prescribed.

Certain carbohydrates have been found to increase brain serotonin levels. Some researchers believe "extra serotonin" helps alleviate PMS symptoms. According to an article in the journal *Obstetrics and Gynecology*, women in a recent study who drank a carbohydrate-rich drink similar to a product called *PMS Escape* experienced fewer PMS-related psychological and appetite symptoms.

*PMS Escape* is a nutritional supplement that may help curb PMS-related depression, anger, and carbohydrate craving. The product is a fruit-flavored powder that is mixed with water. It contains carbohydrates, vitamins, and minerals. *PMS Escape* will not be available in all areas of the country until later this year.
