Drunk teen drivers addressed by Texas Senate

Drunk teen-agers could call the police for a free ride rather than risk making the drive home themselves, under a proposal adopted last week by a state Senate interim committee.

The proposal - to be considered during the 1997 Texas Legislature - is part of a list of law-toughening recommendations passed by the Senate Interim Committee on Juvenile Drinking While Intoxicated Laws.

The committee also voted to establish a zero-tolerance policy for minors, in which drivers under age 21 caught with any alcohol in their system would face a first-offense fine of up to \$500, suspension of their license for up to 120 days, community service and alcohol-abuse awareness courses.

"Juvenile drinking is wrong, period. We all know 21 is the legal age to drink and nothing below, juvenile drinking and driving is absolutely unacceptable behavior. It is a serious and deadly action and we in the Legislature mean business when we say it will no longer be tolerated," said committee member Sen. Florence Shapiro, R-Plano.

Other recommendations by the committee include:

- Increased punishment for those who buy or provide alcohol to a minor; and

- New rules restricting late-night driving for younger teen-agers.

Committee chairman Sen. Royce West, D-Dallas, predicted a "tremendous reduction" in underage drinking

if the recommendations become law. Department of Public Safety records show that in 1995, 158 Texas died in drunken driving accidents. Also in 1995, 3,045 teen-agers were involved in traffic accidents in which the drivers were drunk.

Bush Opposes Welfare Cuts
Gov. George W. Bush said last week that some Texans will "fall through the cracks" if the federal welfare bill signed into law by President Clinton cuts payments to old and disabled Americans.

Federal welfare cuts totaling about \$55 billion are planned over the next five years.

Bush also voiced concern for legal immigrants, whose benefits face big cuts or elimination under the legislation. He said he hopes Congress will revisit the welfare law, regardless of who wins the elections in Nov.

About 13,000 disabled children and 61,000 legal immigrants who are elderly or disabled could lose Social Security benefits. Thousands of legal immigrants also could lose food

stamps. What course Texas takes will depend on the final shape of the new welfare law. Requirements the new welfare law places on states could hurt Texas' welfare reform plans which aim to move Texans off assistance and into jobs and job-training programs.

"Unless we're able to construct the system in a Texas fashion, it will hamstring our ability to get the job done properly," Bush said.

AG Offers Enrollment Guides
Racial and ethnic student enrollment need not erode if Texas colleges and universities follow race-neutral guidelines recommended last week by Texas Attorney General Dan Morales.

Morales said state colleges and universities could boost minority enrollment, although a March federal court ruling put limits on affirmative action.

In a letter to state higher education officials, Morales said that in addition to applicants' test scores and grades, schools should consider age, gender, talent, military service, leadership, public service, hometown, employment history, extracurricular activities, financial status and family socioeconomic history.

"Our young, minority children must know that with hard work, sacri-

fice, commitment and perseverance, educational and professional opportunities await them," Morales said. Many Texas universities including the University of Texas and Texas A&M systems have already instituted some of the admission and scholarship criteria Morales recommended.

Other Capital Highlights
The Texas Insurance Checking Office, an affiliate of the Texas Insurance Advisory Association, has been hired by the state to collect and analyze information about auto insurance rates set by the insurance companies. The Texas Department of Insurance will use the data when the state sets its insurance rates each year. State law allows insurers to set their rates up to 30% above or 30% below the state's benchmark rates.

Texas consumers and businesses should save at least \$460 million in insurance premiums next year because of liability rate reduction factors approved last week by Texas Insurance Commissioner Elton Bomer. The savings result from tort reform legislation passed by the 1995 Texas Legislature. Bomer approved the continued use of the same percentage reductions issued last year on all lines of liability in insurance for 1997.
