Raiders lose close one to Weimar, 28-20

The Raiders opened their 1996 football season with a tough 28-20 defeat at the hands of the Weimar Wildcats. This makes their early season record 0-1.

It was a hard fought game that Rice would have won if they had taken advantage of some early opportunities and had better execution on offense and defense. Our kids played their hearts out and gave it all they had, said their coach.

Offensively, the Raiders had a total of 271 yards; 221 on the ground and 50 in the air. Leading the Rice attack was Maitson Pratt with 114 yards on 13 carries.

Rocky Banks had 58 yards on five carries and scored the team's first touchdown on a 15-yard run. The extra point by Brian Ford was good.

Warren Scott scored the Raiders' other offensive touchdown on a three-yard run at the end of the game. The extra point kick failed.

Scott was 3-11-1 passing with Josh Godley catching two for 30 yards and P. Rangel had the other catch for 20 yards.

The team's offensive execution must improve in order to beat the Shortorns, according to their coach. Defensively, Rice played pretty good, except for a couple of break-downs in the secondary coverage that

led to two easy scores by the Wildcats. With some minor adjustments and hard work in practice, their coach thinks they'll correct those mistakes.

The Raiders scored a touchdown on defense when Clint Gertson intercepted a pass and ran in 50 yards for a goal. The PAT by Ford was good.

Schulenburg comes to town to take on the Raiders this week. Kickoff is at 8 p.m. Friday is Parents' Night, which will get started at approximately 7:30.
