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Views On Dental Health

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Normally, the dental hygienist will perform this task. It's purpose is not only to shine up your pearly whites, but more importantly, to remove the hardened plaque, called calculus that you can't get at. Most of it clings to the base of your teeth or under the gumline.

The calculus removal is done either by hand scraping or with a far-out machine called the Caviron. That's it, brats like a tuning fork. When it is all

removed, your teeth will be polished with an abrasive material called "pumice". Dental floss is used to clean between the teeth. Nothing else gets between the teeth like dental floss. How often should you have a professional cleaning? About once every three months is average. You and your dentist should decide together, based on your dental history and home care.

The next two Sunday evenings, Nov. 3 and Nov. 10, the church will present *Peace Child* and *Against Great Odds*.

Peace Child is the notable and inspiring story of Don Richardson's work in the remote jungles of the Southwest Pacific. They are shocked when the story of Judas' betrayal of Jesus made him a hero to a primitive people who revere treachery. The Richardson's discovery of the "Peace Child" opens the door to the natives understanding of the gospel.

Against Great Odds tells a more recent story. During the years 1982-92, public church meetings were banned in communist Ethiopia. The church went underground, meeting from house to house as the first church child did, and experienced phenomenal growth, although severely persecuted.
