All volunteers involved had a great time exchanging information, ideas, tips and manage to make a profit of \$227. This might become an annual event.

Many Ann Pickens introduced the speaker, Andy Wasowski. Andy and Sally Wasowski are well-known for their books, programs and work with Native Plants.

He gave a review of Sally's book "Requiem for a Lawn Mower". He illustrated with slides how conventional law-bowdage-pool-shaped-shrub landscape were transformed into wonderful lush woodlands, wildlife friendly habitats, requiring less watering, feeding and tending. They call their way of gardening "common sense" gardening - working with Mother Nature and not against her.

Wasowski stressed the beauty and importance of Native Plants and grasses in the landscape. Imagine a water-sucking-fertilizer eating-imported azalea flowering for a couple of weeks in the spring.

The native American Beautyberry (*callicarpa americana*) flowers for a few weeks a little later in the season with gorgeous berries in the summer and fall.

Autumn Sage (*salvia greggii*) is easy to grow and blooms just about all year long in our climate. The native ferns for shady gardens are beautiful. Use Buffalo grass for a low-maintenance lawn.

Mr. Wasowski's program was enjoyed by every one of the 62 people in attendance.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:30 p.m.
