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Views On Dental Health
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Some people like to use an irrigating device (a la waterpik) that sprays water into the mouth to remove loose food particles and other debris. This is especially helpful for those people who have orthodontic bands or fixed bridges. The dentist uses a similar device to wash out your mouth when he cleans your teeth or fills a cavity.

Don't stop there. Your teeth are not getting the complete care they need unless you brush and floss them regularly. An irrigating device can help, but it is not a substitute for a toothbrush or dental floss. Vigorous brushing of teeth and gums helps remove plaque, the bacteria buildup that causes tooth decay. Dental floss helps you get between the teeth where food particles and more plaque are hiding.

Your mouth may feel refreshed when you use a water spray as part of your dental hygiene. That's fine; but brushing and flossing are even more important. They can get to the plaque before it harms your teeth.

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ACT/SAT offered

Juniors and Seniors need to start thinking about their educational future and college entrance exams.

The ACT and SAT exams are needed to enter college. The Academic Excellence Indicator System gave Rice recognized status for the number of people taking the test and the good scores Rice students received.

Students should start taking the test in Jan. and their Junior year and again in June. The tests should be taken again at the beginning of their senior year and once more in Dec. of that year.

The ACT is made up of English, math, reading and science reasoning skills. The test dates for the ACT are: Oct. 26, Dec. 14, Feb. 8, April 12 and June 14.

The SAT test dates are: Oct. 12, Nov. 2, Dec. 7, Jan. 25, March 15, May 3 and June 7.
