Lakeside Mausoleum dedicated

Members of the Eagle Lake community gathered in Lakeside Cemetery Thursday morning, Nov. 14, for the dedication of the newly-constructed Lakeside Mausoleum and Columbarium.

The ceremony was led by Rev. Russell Minter, Christ Episcopal Church, assisted by Father Eddie Winkler, Roman Catholic Parish of the Nativity.

Larry Dulany injected a brief summation during the ceremony on how and why this project came to be. The Lakeside Cemetery Association will offer crypts in the mausoleum until the first of the year for \$1,700 each. After the first of Jan., the cost will go up to \$1,850 per crypt.

Although the initial expense of a mausoleum crypt is greater than the cost of a single grave, the mausoleum becomes more economical since the cost of grave digging, burial vaults and monuments are not incurred.
