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Board of Examiners wants licenses for health plans

The Texas Board of Medical Examiners adopted a position statement that those who administer managed-care health plans—who make decisions affecting the treatment of Texas patients—must have a Texas medical license.

The statement is meant to allow physicians to decide what sort of treatment is appropriate for their patients, according to the TBME board chairman William Fleming III.

The statement also would allow the board to investigate a complaint and recommend legal action for practicing medicine without a license, par-

particular treatment is not practicing medicine. And, she said, the statement would "put the way we manage costs."

Wanted: Pre-release Hearings
State Rep. Peggy Hamric, R-Houston, has filed a legislative proposal that would require hearings for all prisoners in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice before they could be released.

The hearings would be conducted by the Board of Pardons and Pardoners. Hamric said it is wrong to release prisoners without first considering whether they pose a danger.

Gov. George W. Bush said he would make Hamric's bill a priority. "The parole board, not some mathematical formula, should decide whether a prisoner is still a threat to society," Bush said.

Jim Harrington of the Texas Civil Rights Project said, however, that Hamric's proposal may be illegal because it could change the length of some prisoners' sentences.

Under present law, prisoners must be turned over to community supervision when their time is served and their time credits for good behavior equal their sentences.

Free Tuition Proposed
In a letter to Gov. Bush and Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock, Comptroller John Sharp proposed that teachers who stay in their jobs for 10 years should be rewarded with free Texas public college tuition for their children.

Sharp's \$20.3 million proposal is part of his Texas Performance Review. The review would be paid for by at least \$1 billion in savings outlined in the review, he said.

"I believe any responsible corporation in the state would look at this as a solid, cost-effective way to hold on to valuable employees," Sharp said, adding that research shows most teachers who leave the profession do so between their fifth and 10th year on the job.

The proposal would ease a lot of burden for teachers, said Annette Cootes, a spokeswoman for the Texas State Teachers Association.

"That is a big pay raise for a teacher with kids. Teachers have complained that they help other people's kids go to school, but can't send their own," she said.

Other Capital Highlights
"Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry unveiled an exhibit showing 22 Barbie dolls and one Ken doll outfitted in Texas fibers. The exhibit opened in Sept. at the State Fair in Dallas, as part of the "naturally Texas" marketing program to promote the fiber and leather industries in Texas.

The so-called Republic of Texas has issued another claim that the state government is illegal and that it had taken over the state's bank accounts. Ward Tisdale, a spokesman for the attorney general's office, said, "There's absolutely no truth to this. It's a joke as far as we're concerned."

"150 Years of Statehood"
commemorative license plate has been named the best designed new plate of 1995 by the Automotive License Collectors Association. County tax offices issued 1 million pairs of the plates, beginning Dec. 29, 1995, the sesquicentennial anniversary of Texas' statehood.

Newly elected Travis County Sheriff Margo Frasier is not only one of three female sheriffs in Texas, but is one who is openly lesbian. Frasier, a 43-year-old Democrat, won by a margin of 52-to-48%. She ran on her record of law enforcement in Travis County, and her opponent, sheriff's Lt. Alvin Shaw, ran on his. If Shaw had won, he would have been the first African-American sheriff in Texas.

Oil and gas leases sold recently added \$3.6 million to the Permanent University Fund. In a sale conducted by the Board for Lease of University Lands, 43,141 acres were leased, the largest acreage leased in a single sale since 1985. The Board of Lease includes the commissioner of the General Land Office and regents of the U.T. and Texas A&M Systems.

Low Back Pain Affects Millions
Low back pain is a common complaint, resulting in millions of visits to physicians' offices in the United States each year.

Prevention: Preventing low back pain involves (1) learning how to pick up heavy objects, (2) losing "extra" pounds if overweight, (3) sleeping on your back - preferably on a firm mattress, (4) practicing good "sitting habits," and (5) standing erect with shoulders and back straight.

Treatment: The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services released guidelines for the treatment of sudden low back pain in 1995. These guidelines are written for physicians and others who see patients with back pain. However, some of the guidelines deal with self-care and use of over-the-counter medicines. The focus was to keep people as active as possible. For example, bed rest for longer than 4 days was discouraged because it may actually weaken back muscles. Manipulative therapy from physical therapists, osteopathic physicians, or chiropractors sometimes helps. Medicines not recommended include muscle relaxants, steroids, and narcotic pain relievers. Medicines shown to provide safe, short-term relief are aspirin, acetaminophen, and nonsteroidal antiinflammatory medicines such as ibuprofen, and naproxen.
