The Colorado County Commissioners Court approved a resolution in support of giving the County Attorney's office the ability to prosecute felony cases in the County at its Jan. 27

Currently, the County Attorney handles misdemeanor cases. Felony cases are prosecuted by the district attorney's office in Seguin.

The state legislature must approve the County Attorney's handling felony cases. State Representative Robby Cook and Senator Ken Armbrister would have to draft legislation.

A similar resolution was recently passed by the Colorado County Bar Association.

Once the request for felony jurisreaches the State Legislature, approval could be granted by Sept. 1.
