
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
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By Dr. Eric R. Tepper, Podiatrist BEWARE OF BATHROOM SURGERY

It can be tempting. A hard patch of dried skin forms on the bottom of your foot, or a thick lump perches on top of a toe knuckle, and you think, "I can just shave a bit of it off myself." So out comes the razor, and — OUCH! Countless visits to the podiatrist's office every year are brought about by misguided bathroom surgery. There are many problems with do-it-yourself foot excisions. Different kinds of growth (corns, calluses, warts, bunions, etc.) can be easily mistaken for one another, so that what seems to be a patch of perfectly dead, thickened skin may actually be a highly sensitive growth requiring professional treatment. Even more important, though, is that trying to do your own shaving or cutting puts both the growth and healthy tissue at extreme risk, with the common result being painful wounds and infection. Use of caustic over-the-counter chemical products

Self-diagnosis and bathroom surgery may not always be in your own best interest. Whatever problems your feet encounter, attend to them while they are still in their minor stages.
