and donations are encouraged. The goal of the program is to help seniors maintain their independence in their own home.

When the senior citizen becomes more active and is not homebound, and/or is able to perform the duties themselves or someone else performs these duties, then the services will stop. The senior is encouraged to participate in the center's nutrition program where the same meal is served.

Eligibility person age 60 years or over who is homebound by reason of illness, incapacitating disability or is otherwise isolated is eligible to receive home delivered meal services.
