Bishop successfully completed 11 weeks of training designed to challenge new Marine recruits both physically and mentally.

Bishop and fellow recruits began their ranging at 5 a.m., by running three miles and performing calisthenics. In addition to the physical conditioning program, Bishop spent numerous hours in classroom and field assignments including first aid, uniform regulations, combat water survival,

marksmanship, hand-to-hand combat and assorted weapons training.

Bishop and fellow recruits worked as a team to solve a number of tactical problems during the program. They performed close order drill and operated as a Marine small infantry unit in the field.

National Poison Prevention Week

March 16 - 22 is designated *National Poison Prevention Week*. Almost one million people in the U. S. are victims of accidental poisonings each year. Eighty percent of these involve children. Those in the one year to three year age-range are at greatest risk. Here are three things you can do to prevent accidental poisonings:

(1) **Keep all medicines locked in a cabinet:** Nonprescription medicine can be just as toxic to a small child as a prescription medicine. Examples include iron tablets and nutritional supplements containing iron. Recently the U.S. government announced that iron-containing supplements must carry a special warning label. Since the mid 1980s there have been more than 100,000 reports of accidental poisonings related to iron products in children.

(2) **Place the local poison center number near your phone:** Most states have one or more poison control centers that are available 24 hours per day to assist in cases of suspected poisonings. Call the center *before* trying to evaluate or treat a poisoning.

(3) **Keep a bottle of ipecac syrup in the medicine chest:** This medicine may help the person vomit if a poisoning is suspected. Always call the poison center *before* administering ipecac.
