He is employed as an electrical engineering supervisor at Texas Instruments in Stafford.

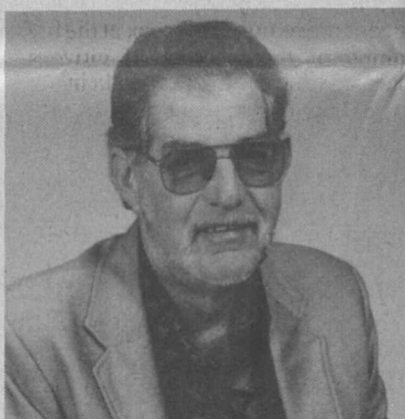
## Raabe running for Commissioner

It would appear that what they intended for the rules to accomplish is to discourage the ordinary citizen from participating in the business of the County and to encourage "invited guest" to come and support the activities of the Court.

One citizen, who had requested at an earlier meeting that the citizens be allowed to vote on the issue of demolishing the old jail, stated that he had read in the paper that the Court had decided such an election would be to expensive. He asked if the Court would explain why it would be so expensive to add an additional item on the ballot at the next regular session? His question was totally ignored

and he was treated as though he had never spoken at all.

The Open Meeting Act may require elected officials to allow citizens the right to speak, but there is no law that requires them to listen to the citizens!

Your County Judge and Commissioners may act very friendly at religious and social gatherings, but you should attend Commissioners' Court and see just how they treat fellow citizens in their official capacity.

Incumbent politicians usually like to run for re-election based on "their record". I urge each of you to be keeping your own record of the activities of Commissioners' Court.

Then, when the next election comes around, you can make an informed decision based on who really wants to represent all the citizens and who wants to represent only the citizens that agree with them!

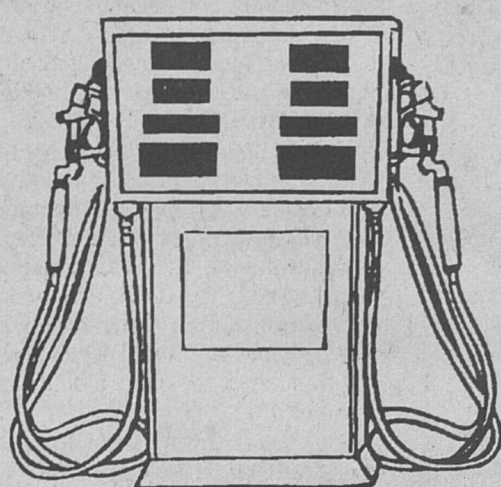
