On site, those attending will view different forage types including Coastal, Jiggs and Tifton 85 Bermuda plus LS-1 and Cherokee Red clovers.

Guest speakers will discuss forage types and provide comparisons, planting and establishment, fertility requirements, weed control and advantages of clover in permanent pastures. Speakers will include Drs. Don Dorsett and David Bade, extension forage specialists.

To reach the field day site from Columbus, go east on IH-10 to FM 949 exit; take FM 949 exit and continue east on service road for 1.7 miles to pasture on the right (south) hand side of road.

One hour of CEU's will be given

DO YOU NEED HELP?

We are a country of do-it-yourselfers. We take pride in managing whatever problems come our way, often without even asking directions.
