Beaumont's day will begin at 8 a.m. on July 17 and last through lunch. "We will address many of the issues from the Feb. Rice Summit, when the industry met to find ways of strengthening itself facing significant challenges," said Dr. Jim Stansel, research

Foot Facts

WARDING OFF WARTS

For most people, warts are just one of life's little unavoidable annoyances. They appear for no apparent reason, and they don't usually cause problems - except when they occur on the bottoms, or "plantar" area, of the feet, where they can be painful to walk on. However, there is something you can do to prevent plantar warts. The key thing to remember is that warts are caused by viruses, which can be passed on contact from one infected surface to another. To minimize the risk of developing warts, don't go barefoot in areas such as locker rooms and gyms, and never share bathing towels. Avoid spreading your own warts by not touching them which exposes healthy skin to the virus.

Home diagnosis and treatment for foot conditions such as warts usually create more problems than they solve. Don't give in to this dangerous practice in the short-term interest of saving a little time and money. In the long run, this could turn out to be a costly choice. Turn instead to the foot care specialists at Rice Medical Center, where we'll pamper your feet with professional, compassionate foot care. I am there every Tuesday. Phone 234-5571.

P.S. Without treatment, plantar warts may spread over the entire sole of the foot, sometimes growing to an inch or more across in size.

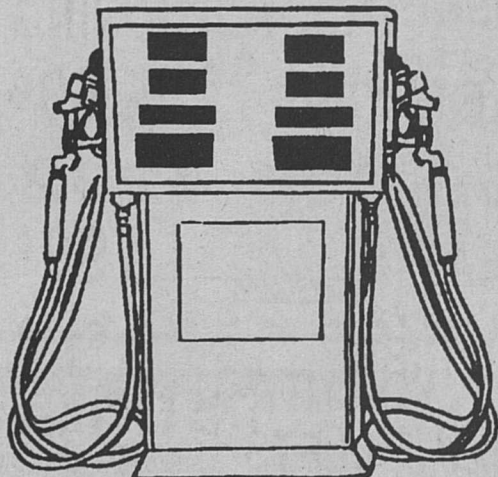
