George Burkes travel East Coast

George and Marion Burkes have recently returned from a trip to New England for the graduation of two grandchildren and some sight-seeing. They drove up to Ogunquit and

Kennebunkport, Maine, where they saw former President George Bush's enclave and sampled fresh lobster several different ways.

From there, they went down the coast to Gloucester, America's oldest seaport, with its bronze statue of the seaman with the notation "They That Go Down To The Sea In Ships".

From there they toured Salem, Mass., (famous for the witches).

Next was Marblehead and its beautiful harbor, yachts and sailboats. There stands the "Old North Church", founded in 1635 on Old Burial Hill.

From there, they toured Boston with its statehouse and harbor where once the famous "tea party" was held, as well as "Anthony's Pier 4" for more lobster and clam chowder.

Then, on to Newport, Rhode Island, and its famous Yacht Club, the town of "The Breakers" (the fabulous home of Cornelius Vanderbilts) and a number of other beautiful homes.

Other points of interest visited by the Burkes included up-state New York, Salem, the Mohawk Trail and Erie Canal and Vermont then to Connecticut to catch a flight home.

Field

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Dr. Edward A. Hiler, vice chancellor and dean, will discuss major changes in rice research and education programs and how they will impact the industry at both field days.

Eagle Lake's field day will highlight a global positioning (GPS) combine system being used in field research. That presentation will be given by Dr. Steve Searcy of A&M Agricultural Engineering Department.

Presentations on disease and weed management and minimum tillage will also be included in Eagle Lake.

The Beaumont field day will feature a presentation by Mark Trostle, director of the pesticide registration program for Texas Dept. of Agriculture. He will discuss what farmers need to do to have necessary agricultural chemicals available for their use.

Other presentations will focus on weed management with the herbicide Liberty, soil nutrient management for rice, and alternatives in crop production for the upper Gulf Coast.

Also, at both field days, Dr. Anna McClung will discuss performance of new rice varieties, including Jefferson, and potential new releases. Dr. M.O. Way will present information on crop protection, regulatory changes and management. Red rice control will also be a focus at both locations.

Beaumont's day will have a theme of "50 Years of Progress," celebrating the 50th Beaumont field day.

The Eagle Lake event is at the research facility on FM 102, three miles northwest of Eagle Lake; in Beaumont it will be at the main station on U.S. 90, 10 miles west of town.

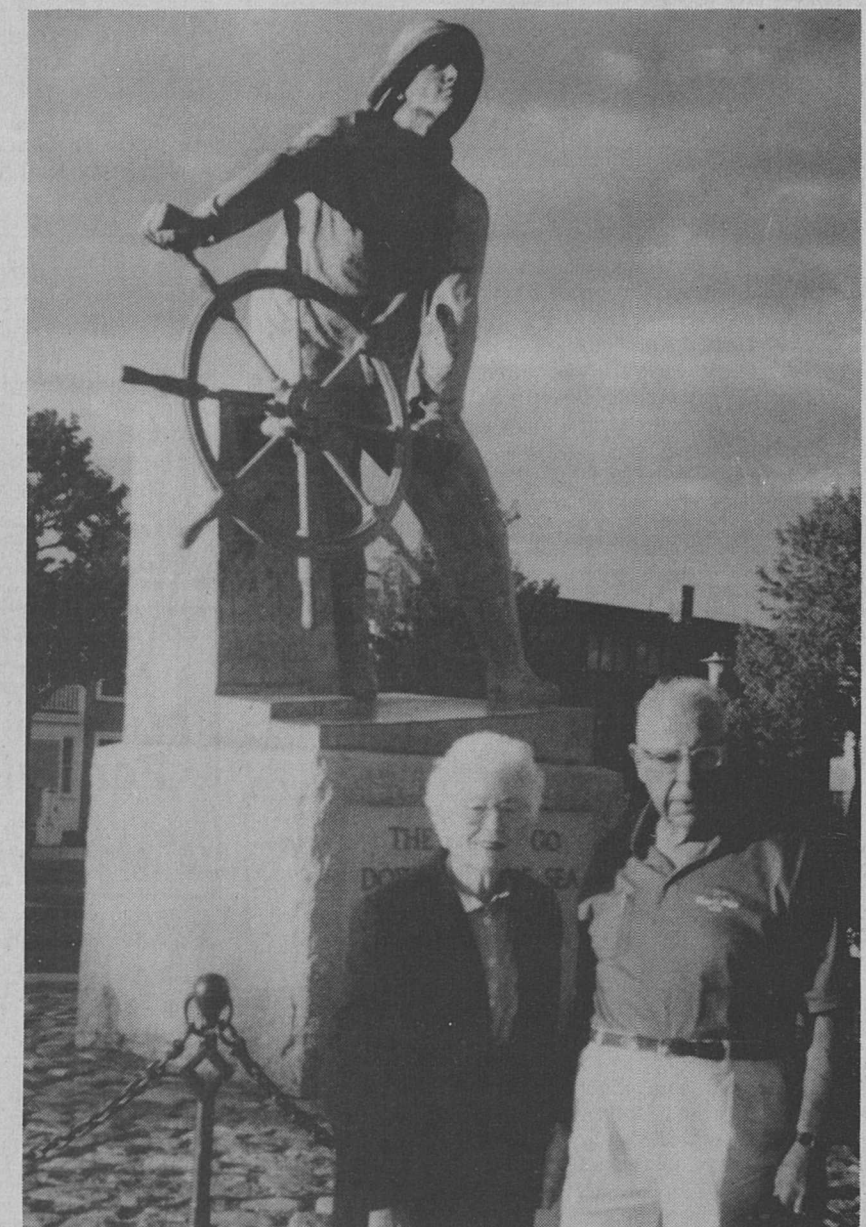

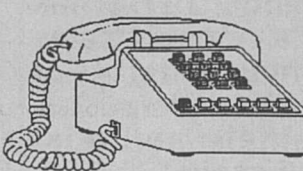
