A. For a flat monthly rate, SW Bell's Local Plus service allows subscribers to place unlimited, toll-free calls any time, any day, to anyone within the Houston/SE Texas Local Plus region.

Q. Is Local Plus available to business and residential customers?

A. Yes.

Q. What is the calling area of Local Plus?

A. Local Plus service is available in 16 counties and 170 cities throughout the Houston/SE Texas area.

Q. Will the new area code affect the calling scope of Local Plus?

A. No, Local Plus combines most of the 281, 409 and 713 area codes into one flat-rate calling area network.

Q. How much does Local Plus service cost?

A. Local Plus will cost residential customers \$30 a month per line and business customers \$60 a month per line.

Q. What is the difference between Local Plus and Extended Metropolitan Service (EMS)?

A. EMS is a two-way calling plan

to a predefined calling scope, while Local Plus allows for one-way outgoing calls across a much larger calling area.

Q. What if I already have EMS service now, but would like to subscribe to Local Plus, how much would it cost?

A. If you already subscribe to EMS Local Plus is offered at a discount rate of \$15 a month for residential customers and \$30 for business customers.

Q. Will I have to pay an installation charge for Local Plus?

A. There is no installation charge for Local Plus.

Q. When will Local Plus be available to consumers?

A. On July 1, 1997, the service became available to all subscribers. SW Bell customer service representative are currently taking orders.

Q. Will my telephone number change if I subscribe to Local Plus?

A. No, customers will not be required to change telephone numbers to subscribe to Local Plus.

Q. Is it necessary to dial "1" when using Local Plus?

A. Customers wishing to place calls within the same area code are free to dial only seven digits. To dial between area codes, there is no need to dial a "1" before the appropriate 1-digit number. If a "1" is dialed, a recording will remind customers that the call is no longer a long distance phone call.

Q. Can I call more than one person at a time if I have three-way calling and Local Plus service?

A. Yes. If you subscribe to three-way calling, it is possible to call one party in the Local Plus calling scope and add another party in the Local Plus calling scope.

Q. Are there any restrictions to the service?

A. The Local Plus service applies to outbound calls only and is available on a per-line basis. The service does not apply to calls placed with another long-distance company, operator-handled, calling card or credit card calls. Local Plus service is not available to Measured Service, Tel-assistance, wireless or Lifeline customers.

Q. Where can I call with Local Plus?

A. Local Plus is available in the following areas: Alvin, Angleton, Bay City, Bellville, Brenham, Cleveland, Clute-Lake Jackson, Columbus, Cypress, Dayton, Eagle Lake, El Campo, Freeport, Galveston, Garwood, Hempstead, Houston, Liberty, Liverpool, Matagorda, Pinehurst, Port Bolivar, Prairie View, Richmond-Rosenberg, Sealy, Smithers Lake, Splendora, Spring.

Also, Texas City-La Marque, Tomball, Valley Lodge, Waller, Wharton, Arcola, Atascocita, Bacliff, Baytown, Beach City, Boling, Brookshire, Crosby, Damon, Dickinson, East Bernard, Glen Flora, Highland, Hitchcock, Huffman, Humble, Katy, Kemah, Kingwood, League City, Mont Belvieu, Nassau Bay, Needville, Old Ocean, Porter, Porter Heights, Rosharon, South Humble, Stafford, Sugar Land, Sweeny, Wallis & West Columbia.

Q. How can I sign up for Local Plus?

A. SW Bell operators are accepting pre-orders for the service at 1-800-234-BELL.

Foot Facts

CORNY, CALLUSED WARNINGS

For many people, the appearance of a corn or callus starts off as a minor annoyance. The bothersome buildups of skin aren't pretty to look at, and they can make wearing shoes uncomfortable. The fact is, however, that when they appear on the toes, those "nuisance" corns and calluses may be warning signs of underlying joint problems. For example, a callus or corn that forms on the side of a toe might indicate the presence of a bone spur—an overgrowth of bone that can occur alone or in combination with other problems. The extra bone pushes the soft tissue to rub against the shoe, and a hardened, painful shield builds up. The corns or calluses may be cushioned by the use of padding, or relieved by choosing an accommodating shoe with a wide toe box; however, until the bone malformation itself is treated, the problems won't go away.

Painful corns have probably caused more foot pain and misery than any other single problem. And since life is complicated enough without having to contend with problems that can be corrected, professional advice from a podiatrist who has been specially trained to care for feet is your best defense. We're on your side, whether you're dealing with corns, calluses, hammer-toes, nail disorders, sports injuries, bunions, or hereditary condition. P.S. Rigid or buckled toes can also cause calluses to form on the bottom of the foot, due to abnormal downward pressure.
