Thursday, Oct. 2, as part of the Rice Medical Center Health Fair, the Eagle Lake Volunteer Fire Department and the Colorado County EMS Unit 803 held a demonstration on how they work together to extricate victims from a wrecked vehicle. Fire Chief Gary Glaister explained the process of freeing "victim" Billy Cook from the wreckage.

In the picture below, while the EMS Unit 803 stabilized and assessed the patient, ELVFD used the spreader, better known as the "Jaws of Life", to establish a passageway to free the victim from the vehicle. In assessing the patient, the EMS medic-in-charge will decide if Life Flight is needed at the scene. These two departments are a vital part of our community and the lights and siren should be respected at all times.

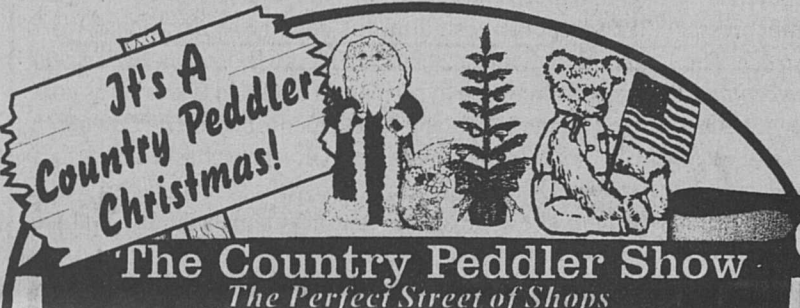
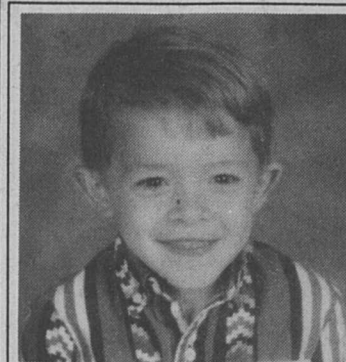

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THE MARYLAND BRIDGE

The MARYLAND BRIDGE won't make it easier to drive to Baltimore, but it may keep you smiling. Why? Because this "resin-bonded retainer" is a method for replacing missing teeth. Unlike conventional bridgework, it doesn't require capping teeth on either side of the missing one. It is held in place by metal wings which are cemented to the inside of the neighboring teeth.

MARYLAND BRIDGES are well suited for younger patients whose nerve pulp is too large to allow for crowns; for patients undergoing periodontal treatment; for orthodontic pa-

tients; and for economic reasons (it usually costs less than a fixed bridge). A patient who is fitted with a MARYLAND BRIDGE must devote extra time to the flossing and brushing required to keep gum tissue free of plaque.

MARYLAND BRIDGES are not applicable in all cases, but if it's right for your case, we'll be happy to discuss the necessary consideration with you.
