The Lower Colorado River Authority (LCRA) will discuss options for meeting the region's future water needs at an open house Thursday, March 12, beginning at 7 p.m. at the Veterans Center in Columbus. The public is invited to attend.

"If you use water, this is for you," said Joe Beal, manager of WaterCo, LCRA's water operations section.

LCRA staff will host exhibits on possible options for stretching the region's water sources to meet increasing demands into the next century, including water conservation, groundwater development and channel dams.

The meeting will also feature exhibits on related issues such as recreation and the environment.

"We plan a very informal open house, with no speeches or presentations," said Jeff Saunders, LCRA hydrologist who is coordinating the meeting. "You'll be able look at the informational exhibits and talk with LCRA staff, ask questions or express any concerns."
