

# Go-Texan weekend held in Houston, winners listed

Go Texan winners from 61 counties throughout the state gathered in Houston on Go Texan Week-end, Feb. 13-15, to compete for scholarships awarded by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo (HLS&R).

Each Go Texan Committee in all 61 counties automatically earns a \$2500 scholarship. The scholarships jumps to \$5000 if a county participates in every event in Houston during Go Texan Week-end and the counties committee has fulfilled all its requirements.

The county in each of the eight Go Texan Districts that accumulates the most first through 10th place points in the Houston competition earns a \$10,000 scholarship.

Colorado County has earned the District 6 scholarship the past two years competing against Jackson, Dewitt, Victoria, Wharton, Lavaca, Matagorda and Calhoun counties.

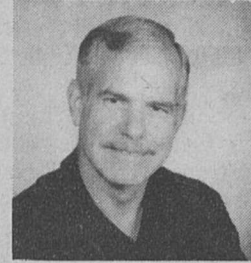

## Pesticide applicator training, testing session set

The Colorado County Office of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will sponsor a private pesticide applicator training and testing on Thursday, March 12.

The training and testing program will be held at the Colorado County Agriculture Building, 316 Spring St. in Columbus.

Registration begins at 3:45 p.m. followed by the training at 4 p.m.

The test will be administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture beginning at 7 p.m.

A small pocket calculator may be helpful as there will be some math problems on the exam.

The registration fee is \$25 per person. This fee includes a study manual which participants are encouraged to secure beforehand for review. Study manuals are available at the

County Extension Office.

This training is designed for individuals wishing to obtain a private applicators license.

As defined by law, a private pesti-

cide applicator is any person who uses or supervises the use of a restricted-use or state-limited-use pesticide for the purpose of producing an agricultural commodity.

### MAKE FIRST VISIT FUN

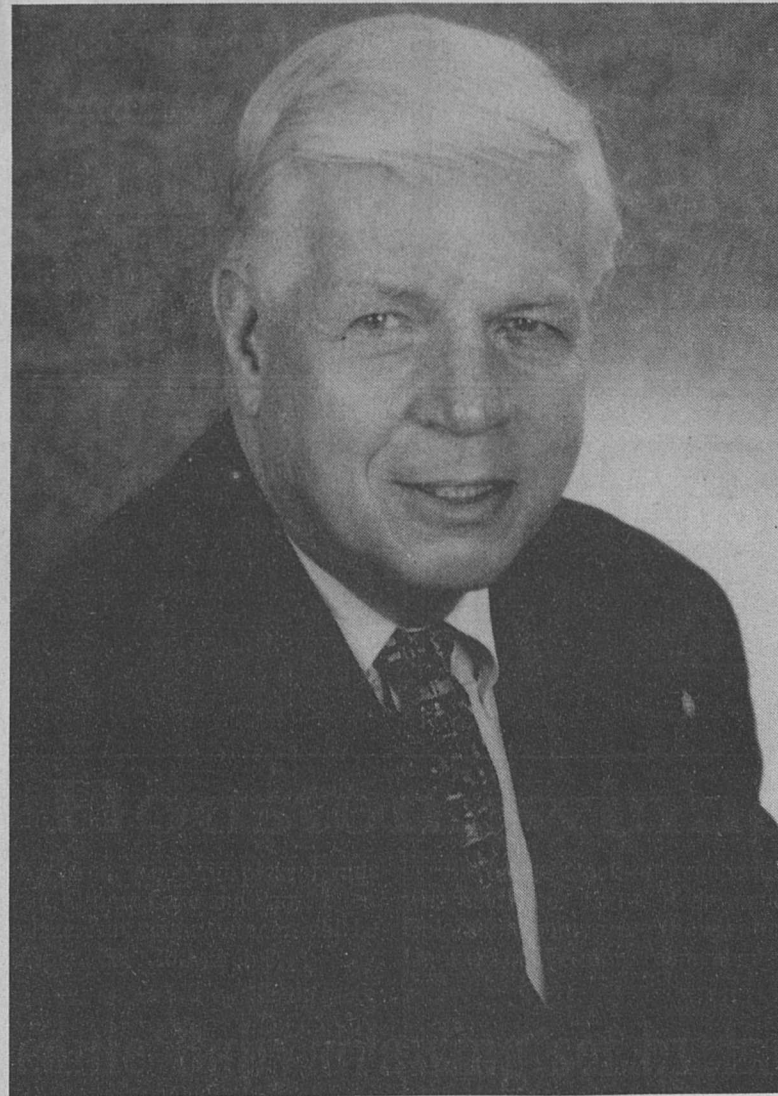
The American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry recommends that children see a dentist by their first birthday. It may seem young, but we see so many 3 and 4-year-old kids with problems that could have been prevented. Going to the dentist for the first time can be fun and productive — if you prepare your child properly.

Suggestions: Discuss the visit with your child without frightening him, making him or her aware of the significance of the occasion for good dental health. Think and talk about the dentist as a friend. Avoid using words like hurt, drill, pain, needle and shot.

At the end of the visit, plan regular follow-up checkups for your child and remember that children get most of their impressions from their parents. So set a good example! Clean your teeth thoroughly at least once a day, brush after meals and snacks whenever possible, eat wholesome foods, visit your dentist regularly and most important — have a positive attitude about dental health.
