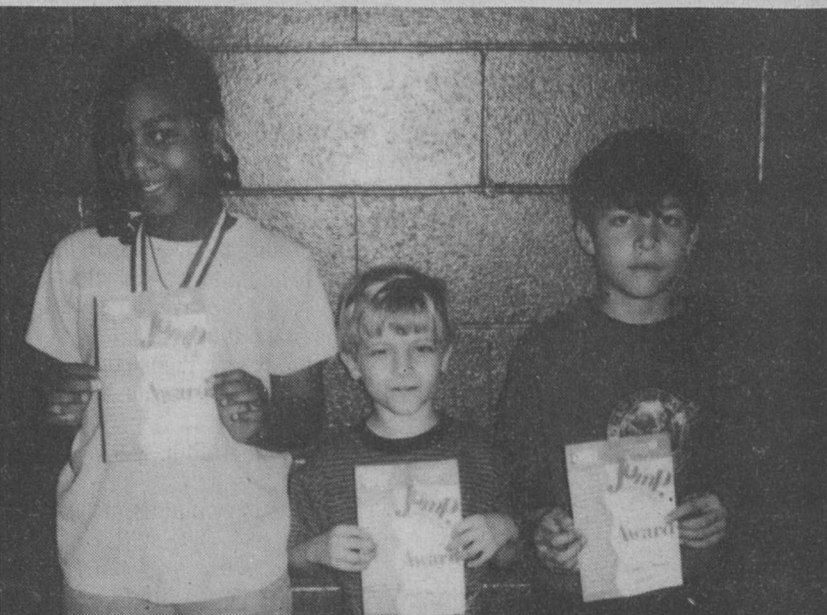

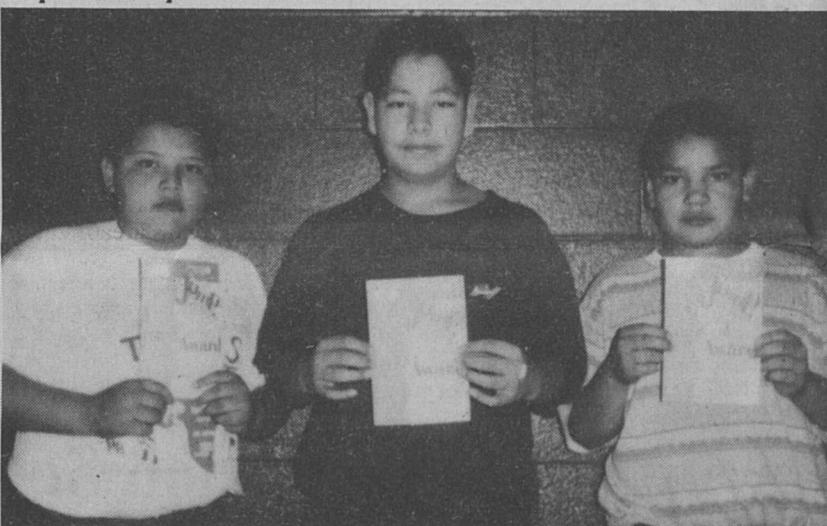
"We are proud of what these students have accomplished and hope

they have gained from the contribution to a serious cause as well as from the physical benefits from participating in the program," said Coach Dennis Jackson.

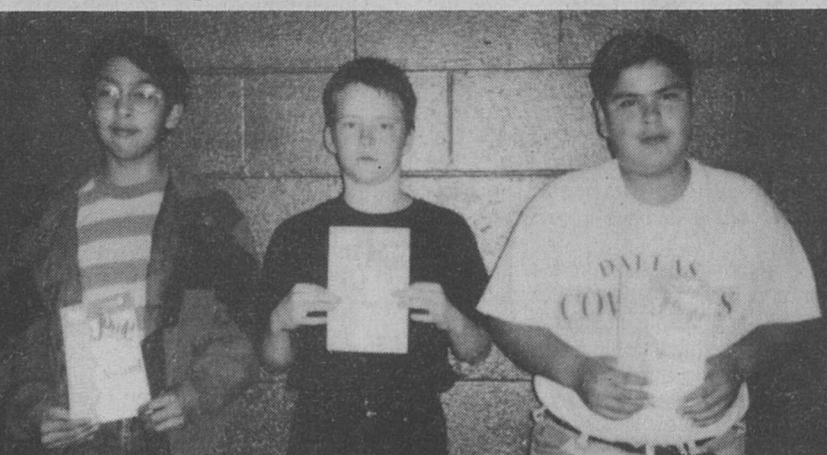

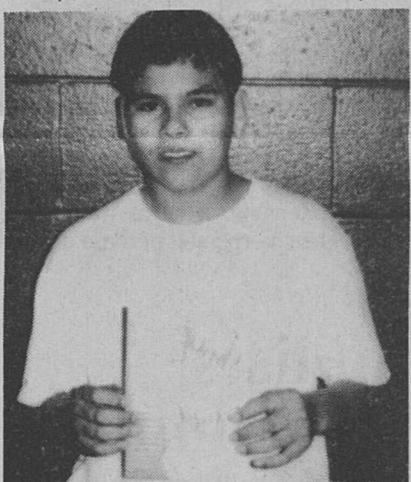
Top finishers in the fourth grade were Jessica Black, top over all, Chris Supak and Alphonso Castillo.

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Pharmacists Again Rated Number One

Among professional people, pharmacists are still number one. That is the result of a new CNN/USA Today/Gallup Poll conducted to determine the highest rated profession based on honesty and ethical standards. Of the 26 professions evaluated, pharmacists ranked at the top of the list for the ninth straight time. The first poll was conducted in 1988. Sixty-nine percent of individuals polled in 1997 rated pharmacists with a score of "high" or "very high" when asked about honesty and ethical standards. This was the highest percentage ever recorded for any profession since polling began. The clergy came in second, followed by physicians, college teachers, dentists, policemen, engineers, funeral directors, and bankers.

The latest poll confirms a continuing confidence that patients have in pharmacists. One of the perceptions that many people have of their pharmacist is that of public service. Many pharmacists provide services that consumers cannot find elsewhere — from what to do about a symptom or potentially more serious health problem, to assistance on local school science projects. Pharmacists are trained as scientists and health care providers. Many now receive training at the doctoral level, and some go on to specialize in one or more areas of health care delivery.
