Infections involving the ears are a common problem encountered by small children. An estimated five million Americans suffer from middle or outer ear infections. The good news is that the U.S. Food and Drug Administration recently approved two new medicines for ear infections. Both will be available as ear drops. These will be the first prescription ear drop medicines approved in over 20 years.

The first medicine to be released this year is ofloxacin (Floxin Otic). It is recommended to be used twice a day for 10 to 14 days, with or without an oral antibiotic. The other medicine is a combination of the antibiotic ciprofloxacin and hydrocortisone (Cipro HC). Both medicines are in the family of antibiotics called quinolones and both can be used to treat infections in the outer ear. Floxin Otic has been approved for acute middle ear infections in children up to 12 years of age who have ear tubes. The drug also has been approved for chronic infections in teens and adults with a perforated eardrum. You can warm the ear drops by gently rolling the prescription bottle in your hands before placing drops into the child's ear. If the drops are cold before they are placed into the ear, they can cause dizziness, especially if they get into the middle ear.
